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More Essays on Teeth

Following appear the last three essays on the care of teeth as written by pupils in the Lincoln building this spring:

Good Teeth

We often wonder why and how many people have such good teeth while others are green and yellow. People who have green and yellow teeth do not look as nice as those with white teeth. People who have green and yellow teeth do not take pains in cleaning them. Some may never brush them. People with nice clean teeth always wash their teeth, eat many vegetables and drink milk, which helps to make and get good teeth.

Good Teeth

You should brush your teeth because when you are older and your teeth are gone, you will wish you had brushed them.

When you are six months old you start with your baby teeth which last until you are six years old when you start with your permanent ones. Coys.

When you are ten years old you should have most of them.

But you cannot have these in very good condition if you don't brush them. You should not eat many sweet foods. The best foods are apples, carrots, baked apples, celery, lettuce and meat.

The dentist should look at your teeth about twice a year. If this is not done he will probably give you another set which you will not like so well. — Jim Schaefer.

Good Teeth

There are as many ways as you have teeth to keep your teeth in good condition. Some of the ways are: Brush them at least once a day. Eat good teeth-building foods, which consist of carrots, toast, oranges, etc.

Every man and woman and also children above eight years of age should have a full set of 32 permanent teeth, and strong. In order to have them you must do some of the things mentioned in the above paragraph.

You should see a dentist every six months, having your teeth cleaned and also, if necessary, any other faults about them corrected.
