action will be taken until his return. Payment of \$1568.71 was ordered made to Goss & Knapp for the work already done at the water reservoir. The engineer's estimate of material on the ground and work performed was \$1839.66.

The city engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for a larger sewer from the manhole at the intersection of Front and Willard streets to the river. Eight and ten inch sewers empty into the manhole there, with an 8-inch outlet and with the new buildings in the business section this year it is certain that basements in the business district will be flooded next winter unless relief is given with a large outlet.

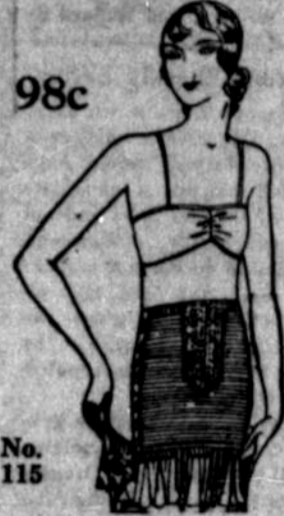
