### County Central Committees Will Name Candidates

The question of who may be a candidate for election as county treasurer next November is easily settled. There can be but one republican and one democratic candidate. And those two will be named by the respective county central committees. Anyone else running must do so as an independent.

The law regulating the procedure was passed by the legislature in February, 1925, and reads as follows:

Sec. 3975. Death or Withdrawal—Vacancies. In case any candidate under the provisions of this act shall die, withdraw, or for any reason be ineligible, or if there shall occur a vacancy by death, resignation or otherwise, in the office of United States senator or representative in congress, or in any elective state, district, county or precinct office, on or after the day set by law for holding primary nominating elections, or if such vacancy occur before such nominating election but within such a time that a candidate for such vacancy could not be nominated at such election, either the state, congressional or county central committee, as the case may be, of any political party, or the managing or executive committee thereof, may nominate a candidate for such vacancy upon the call of the chairman of such state, congressional or county committee, and the name of the person so nominated for such vacancy shall be certified to the proper officer by the chairman of such committee, attested by the secretary thereof, substantially in the manner provided by sections 3932 and 3933, Oregon Laws; and in event such nomination is filed with the secretary of state he shall certify the same to the various county clerks in the manner prescribed in section 3933, Oregon Laws.

### S. C. Rogers Passes at 95

After a life of three score years on Coos river Stephen C. Rogers passed away last Thursday afternoon and was buried in the cemetery near the forks of the river Saturday afternoon, beside the remains of his wife who passed away in 1922.

Mr. Rogers was the father of Mrs. Cynthia Shorwood of this city, and before he became so enfeebled by age was a frequent visitor in Coquille. He leaves besides a son, Frank E. Rogers, of Coos river, and another daughter, Mrs. Nelly Ellzey, of Wadena, Minn. There also survive 16 grandchildren, seven great grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

S. C. Rogers was born in Danby, Vermont, in 1834. He removed to New York state in 1850 where he married and operated a brick plant until he was 36 years of age. Stricken with an illness which the doctors told him would prove fatal, Mr. Rogers came west to die, not giving up hope, however, that the change would be beneficial. And it was. He landed at Empire in December, 1870, went a few miles up Coos river and located on a tract of land, which has since grown to an estate of 500 acres, and was six months past 95 years of age when he answered the last call.

### Forage Supply Secured

#### From Different Grasses

On most farms fields of blue grass, alfalfa or clover are at hand to supply a good share of the forage. These crops, particularly the alfalfa and clover, are rich in protein, of good mineral content, and palatable. They are highly efficient for hog pasture. To use them often means little else than fencing, temporary or permanent, to hold the stock. Then, to fill in the times at which these crops cannot be used or in case of their absence, annual forages should be provided. Several such annuals have demonstrated their worth for this purpose. Of these none is perhaps better known or more generally used than dwarf Essex rape, which, on good soil, produces a luxuriant, palatable forage that will stand vigorous grazing by hogs.

#### Best Forage Crops

Alfalfa and clover rank among the best forage crops for pigs. Dwarf Essex rape is perhaps the best hog forage that can be pastured in the same season in which it is seeded. Sweet clover produces an abundance of growth, but is not palatable to pigs. In several experiments pigs on it have made slower gains and required more concentrates per unit of gain than those on rape or clover. Soy bean pasture is well liked, but it has a rather low-carrying capacity, and lasts for only a relatively short time.

#### Need for Exercise

An important thing overlooked is the necessity for exercise. It is a good plan to have one's feeding floor or quarters quite a ways from the sheds. In this way sows are sure to get a certain amount of exercise. A heavy sow and ewe, are both inclined to be lazy as they get well along, and nothing is much more certain to cause trouble in either than a lack of exercise. Sow's milk is said to contain a larger per cent of mineral than that of any other mammal.
