maining 27 prizes there were 79 entries made.
One dozen song birds loaned added greatly to the effect. Thanks are due the owners of the birds.
For the table displays of beautiful settings thanks are due to Mrs. Geo. Chaney for dinner table, Mrs. O. C. Sanford and Mrs. H. A. Slack for luncheon table and Mrs. J. Arthur Berg for tea table. The added department was very attractive.
The campfire girls assisted in many ways, directing people as they brought exhibits, taking charge of silver offerings and attending to registration of visitors.
Thanks are due to the judges, Messrs. Keeling, Huggins and Barton, for the impartial judging carefully done to the satisfaction of all; though it was not an enviable position.
Entry clerks deserve special mention, together with the judges' work, theirs is most particular and difficult and not one error was found in the entries. The only chance for argument between judges and clerks was on the classification of roses, often very difficult to decide.
Committees generally worked continually for days and evenings on plans and arrangements.
Thanks are due to out-of-town communities and florists. J. D. Bergen was the only professional florist to enter an exhibit and he displayed a beautiful bridal scene which caused many complimentary remarks. Four communities showed co-operation by putting on entire tables of miscellaneous cut flowers and growing plants. North Bend took the lead in displaying a beautiful array on a 30-foot table. Myrtle Point came second and Port Orford, though not having so extensive a display, deserves great credit for distance travelled in coming to the show. Marshfield made a beginning with choice specimens and promised a bigger and better display another year.
The West Coast Lumber Co. mill loaned lumber for table tops which was a great accommodation.
We could not have enjoyed the show nearly so well had we not been given the pleasure of hearing the selection of readings, speeches and songs of those who took part in the program in both the afternoon and evening.
Last and probably greatest thanks are due Mr. Taylor, president of the club, who made the show possible.
Thanks should also be extended to the community at large for so generously bringing their choicest collections of blossoms for the pleasure of all flower lovers interested in their culture and in beautifying of our city. The dressed-up appearance of our gardens adds to the attractiveness as well as to the impression given by the community whenever we have contact with visiting strangers.
