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Prediction is made that ships and railroads will be run increasingly by electric energy in the near future, following upon the performance of the new liner "California" and effective use of juice in mainline tunnels and established runs on transcontinental roads.

Light and power executives agreed to spend \$860,000,000 for new construction and extensions in 1936. Now it appears that the total will be more than one billion. This does not include the large sums used for investigations, experiments, industrial research, application of new principles, and excursions into the realms of pure science. These are part of the annual budget which provides for constant improvement of service, with reduced rates to consumers.

Oregon leads in the number of Chinese pheasants raised and liberated in the United States, according to the American Game Protective Association. Last year Oregon's game department raised and liberated 6,000 more Chinese pheasants than were freed in New York, the second state. Oregon's state game commission is the only one that successfully raises Hungarian pheasants. Last year the commission liberated more wild turkeys, wild ducks and guinea fowl than were turned free in any other state.

The additional parking space, made available by the Lions Club for parking in Willard street, does not seem to benefit as many automobile drivers as it was expected. With the American tendency to think only of self, the first few cars which drive up on the parking spaces are left at the sloped end so that it is impossible for cars to use all of that 100 feet of space unless the late comers drive up over the curb as previously.

That thoughtlessness of the rights of others is also frequently seen by a driver who steps his car on the highway, on or near a curve, endangering all cars which approach.

Four states have laws to prohibit the hitch-hiker from doing his begging along motor routes. Maine, New Jersey, Minnesota and Wisconsin have enacted statutes making it a misdemeanor to stand in the highway and solicit a ride in an automobile, reports the Oregon State Motor Association. The District of Columbia has a similar law. The Minnesota statute is typical of such laws; it provides: "No person shall stand in the traveled portion of a roadway for the purpose of or while soliciting a ride from the driver of any vehicle other than a common carrier."

The London naval treaty has the hearty support of General Charles G. Dawes who is at home for a vacation and to look after the affairs of the great exposition which Chicago is sponsoring in 1939.

The Ambassador to Great Britain and former Vice President was the guest of the White House while in Washington and also visited the Senate over which he presided for four years. He discussed the London Naval Treaty with Senator Borah and others and was enthusiastic in his praise of it and what its approval will mean to this country and the world in the way of peace and reduced costs in naval armament.

"The general public of the world," said Mr. Dawes, "in my judgment, realizes the vital importance of the ratification by the powers concerned of the naval treaty, and that in the outcome of this issue primarily lies a present advance or retardation of the cause of world peace. I am confident that this treaty will be ratified."

"The treaty represents the greatest step ever taken in naval reduction and limitation, and at the same time secures parity for the United States which could only be attained by fifteen years' naval race and a cost of \$2,000,000,000, during which times we would have naval inferiority and curtailment of other useful government activities. It protects us both in the Atlantic and in the Pacific."

## Where Do You Swim?

State Board of Health  
 Swimming is unquestionably one of the most delightful and healthful of exercises and should be encouraged in every way. If you haven't already learned to swim by all means do so. It not only provides a very enjoyable form of recreation but it might, and often does, prove of very practical use. Where to swim should be given careful consideration. There are hundreds of rivers and lakes throughout the state, some near by and some far away, which are frequented by swimmers or bathers. The water in many of these is relatively safe, in others it is not. Short of having a test of the water at the point in which you expect to swim and at a time when this body of water and its surrounding cottages and buildings are being used, there is no way of knowing definitely the purity of the water but there are a number of points of observation which will be helpful in determining the probable safety of a swimming place.

(1) Always remember that a water is not safe to swim in unless it is safe to drink.

(2) Don't place confidence in the appearance of the water. A water may look perfectly clear and still be grossly polluted.

(3) Pay particular attention to the location of the lake or stream and its drainage. What are the possibilities of pollution from cottages? Are there streams running into the body of water in which you intend to swim, and if so do they contain water of known purity or may they be polluted by drainage from the territory through which they run? In addition to having safe water the swimmer should safeguard himself with respect to a number of other points.

Never go into deep water far from shore unless a good swimmer or boat accompanies you. A severe cramp will drown the very best swimmer.

Do not go in bathing until one hour and a half, preferably two hours, after eating.

If over-heated, cool off gradually before entering the water.

Never dive into water without first determining its depth and the possible presence of rocks or other obstructions.

Do not over-expose yourself to the sun. Take only a few minutes at a time in the sun until after you have

developed a protective coat of tan. Learn to swim and enjoy it but be sure that you swim in safe water and that you use reasonable precautions to avoid possible accidents.

## News From State Capital

The public service commission, for the past several years laboring under the threat of abolishment in one form or another, is now in hot water over rumors that Governor Norblad may deal his next blow in that direction. The fact that the governor himself refuses to discuss the situation, either to affirm or deny the rumor, is taken here as indicative of the fact that he has some such move under consideration. During the recent primary campaign some hard feeling was engendered between the governor and Frank Miller, chairman of the commission, as the result of a reprimand administered by the governor to Miller in connection with the Portland street railway case. It was expected at the time that Miller would probably pay the penalty of having incurred the governor's displeasure with his job but the governor denied that he had any designs on Miller's scalp and the matter has rested there until the recent rumor has revived interest in the situation. Under an act passed by the 1929 legislature the members of the commission are appointed by the governor but are not supposed to be removable except for "cause" which, however, is not difficult to establish in any event when necessary.

More than 5,000 people took advantage of the "open house" to visit the new state office building Saturday night. Governor Norblad, State Treasurer Kay and Secretary of State Hoas were in the receiving line to greet the visitors and employees of the various departments acted as guides to show the visitors about the building. Music was provided by an orchestra composed entirely of state employees. The various offices as well as the first floor lobby of the building were beautifully decorated with flowers. The building, a five story and basement structure, was recently completed at a cost of approximately \$510,000.

Governor Norblad will not be denied his salary for the time he was away from the state on his recent eastern trip. Secretary of State Hoas, falling back upon an opinion written by the attorney general in 1920, has decreed that Norblad shall draw the salary of chief executive and that acting governor Hamilton must take his compensation out in the honor which attaches to the office. Not only will Hamilton be denied any salary as governor for the two weeks he served during the absence of Norblad but he is also out his hotel expenses while in Salem as well as the expense of the trip between his home at Bend and the state capital.

Appointments announced by Governor Norblad this week include the following: Lee Eysley, of Salem, as a member of the state board of aeronautics, succeeding A. B. McKenzie, of Portland; Miss Pauline Kline of Corvallis, reappointed a member of the state board of child labor inspectors; Dr. R. C. Ellsworth, of Portland, as a member of the state board of chiropractic examiners, succeeding Dr. David Long of Portland; Wm. J. Piepenbrink, of Portland, as a member of the state board of accountancy succeeding Seth L. Roberts, of Portland.

More than 60,000 horses were slaughtered in Oregon for human consumption during the past year, according to Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian. This represents approximately one-half the number of horses killed for food in the United States. From 100 to 200 horses are slaughtered daily in Portland for food purposes under federal inspection.

## Good Manners in the Forests

The U. S. Forest Service says: You may be reasonably "wild and woolly" when you go camping in the national forests of Oregon and Washington, but don't leave your good manners at home. Take them with you. You need them more on your vacation than when you are at home. The rules for Good Manners as given by the U. S. Forest Service are easy to learn and are followed by all good sportsmen, good campers and good tourists. They are:  
 First obtain a camp fire permit. Carry a shovel and ax.  
 Smoke only in camp.  
 Drown your fire dead out with water.  
 Leave a clean and sanitary camp.  
 Observe the State fish and game laws.  
 Co-operate with the forest rangers and state fire wardens in reporting and suppressing forest fires.  
 Practice these rules and preach them, too.
