New Power Plant Opened

More than 2,000 people, many of them from Coquille and this side of the county, were conducted through the new steam generating plant of the Mt. States Power Co., at North Bend last Friday evening. Division Manager Thos. Neas and his assistants acting as hosts.

The response to the general invitation issued the public bespoke a great community interest. Guides piloted the visitors about the building and explained in detail the massive machinery which at capacity produces 15,000 kilowatts of electrical energy. Light refreshments were served during the evening.

The first unit of the present plant was erected in 1924, and on July 1 of this year the second unit was completed. Two 985 horse power water tube boilers furnish the steam for the turbines which drive the large generators. Hog fuel is used. This is the refuse from Coos Bay lumber mills and it is transported in barges to the plant where large storage bins are provided.

Another service improvement recently completed by the company was the building of a high tension power line from Dixonville to Marshfield, a distance of 65 miles. This is known as Line 20 and has a carrying capacity of 110,000 volts.
