Schools Open Next Tuesday

Some eight hundred boys and girls will return next Tuesday morning to the routine of nine more months of school when the doors of the three schools in Coquille will swing open again to welcome young America.

The students will find all three buildings clean and shining, with newly surfaced desks and seats, newly surfaced blackboards, newly painted woodwork, freshly oiled and varnished floors—all the result of a summer of hard work put in by the three janitors, H. L. Johnson, J. D. Bell, and M. C. Miller.

Registration of high school students will take place this afternoon, tonight and Saturday morning, in the high school building. All students are urged to register at one of these times, rather than wait until school has begun, as time is lost by the student, and classes may be closed by then as a result of too great a demand for some certain subject.

Registration of grade school students will take place Tuesday morning.

An increased enrollment of about 75 students is expected this year, 60 of this number coming from out of town to high school as a result of school busses being established. In the Junior high, there is a possibility of an extra teacher being needed, due to an increase of thirty in this department. This need cannot be determined, however, until after the first day of school. Superintendent Ferguson is now looking for a man to handle this work if the necessity of hiring a teacher should present itself.

As in the past, children may enroll in the first grade if their sixth birthday is before January first of next year. Otherwise the child will wait until the following fall to enroll.
