OUT-OF-DOORS STUFF

A member of the Coos County Game Protective Association, last week at a meeting made a statement that there should be a bounty on otter as they were destroying thousands of fish. To place a bounty on an animal means that it is lawful prey to the trapper or hunter at any season of the year.

During the summer months, otter hang about certain territory and would prove easy prey to the trapper. At this season their fur is valueless and it would mean that thousands of dollars worth of fur would wantonly be destroyed. It would mean almost total extinction of a great commercial value.

Many a statement is made and made in good faith by sportsmen who really are not acquainted with facts. While it is true that otter prey upon fish it is not the small fry that they catch. Ninety-nine times out of a hundred it is a mature fish, even the largest of salmon, thus not taking hundreds of fish a day to supply this fast disappearing fur-bearer as is the case of the blue heron or crane, fish ducks, kingfishers. All these birds are protected by law. They prey on small fish and destroy millions of them. Now there are the enemies to our fish that should come under the bounty system. They are of no commercial value and why should they be protected? One flock of fish ducks will catch more fish during one day than an ordinary angler will catch in years and probably a lifetime.

I was told at one time that the blue heron or crane was protected on account of its being so picturesque as it stood silently at the edge of the water waiting to scoop up a bill full of unsuspecting small fish.

But I am sure that the ordinary sportsman, or rather run of sportsmen, fail to find anything picturesque or graphic about this long-legged, long-necked, long-billed old scoundrel, who, like the fish duck and kingfisher has no regard for open or closed seasons and are busily engaged in depleting our streams throughout the year.

The trophy will be presented to The Coquille Archers and will be retained by this club, to be shot for at each annual shoot. A cup will also be rewarded to the lady making the highest score at the September shoot. The cup will be presented to the winner through the generosity of Hank Burr, John Stone and Grover Gauthier, the three leading archers of the Coquille team.

The fish appeared to be on a strike in the Rogue river last Sunday. No catches were reported. A. H. Grimes and wife, who made the trip down there, failed to get even a single strike.

It will take a good rain to start the fish in earnest and until then fishing in any stream will be mighty undependable.

What is it? Who can identify it? Dozens of woodmen, trappers and hunters have been asked to identify the animal that was killed by a bobcat four miles east of this place last week. All parts of the animal killed were eaten by the bobcat with the exception of its tail. Having always prided myself upon knowing every animal and its habits in this part of the country I was somewhat taken aback when I came upon the bobcat's kill and failed to recognize the tail of the slain one. This same tail has undergone the careful scrutiny of dozens of woodmen but still the mystery remains unsolved.

The tail is about four inches in length, white underneath and gray on top and white-tipped at the end and is of a very delicate texture. It did not come from a gray or a digger or any sort of squirrel ever seen in this country and it is much too long for a rabbit. It was found in a territory in which digger squirrels abound. Whether it was preying upon diggers when it met its end beneath the claws of the bobcat or merely traveling through, it is another mystery. Whether it was a predatory animal or merely a large rodent will also remain unsolved unless some one is able to identify that mysterious tail.

Trout are unusually wary this year, or rather at this season of the year. The water in the various trout streams is very low and clear. This makes the trout very hard to cope with. They can spot an angler yards away and upon sight of him they hit for cover. The mere shadow of your line across the water, while making a cast, serves to frighten them. It takes a fisherman of experience to catch a good string now-a-days.

A movement among "the powers that be," I understand has been started to declare an open season on pigeons. These birds are now protected by both federal and state laws with no open season at any time of year. It would
