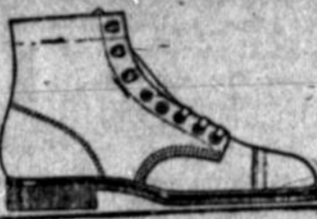

Ass'n Hears N. Y. Speaker

Visitors from the outside at the luncheon meeting of the Coos County Health Association Monday noon, were Wm. French, of New York, medical director of the Commonwealth Foundation; his assistant, Miss Kraker; Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer; and Dr. Estella Ford-Warner, of the Marion county health department. The latter gave a very interesting talk on their work in Marion.

The purpose of the meeting was to explain what the Commonwealth Foundation is, but as only four states will be selected this year, and but two counties in each state for inaugurating the program, there is little chance that it will become a live subject in Coos county.

In operation it is similar to the Rockefeller foundation with a 50-50 co-operation between Foundation and county. If it should happen that Oregon and Coos county should be selected it would mean an additional nurse and a health supervisor in this county.

As the Rockefeller Foundation support has been entirely withdrawn here, the county bearing the entire expense, it is not probable that Coos county would assume the additional obligation at this time, even if the opportunity were offered.
