To provide funds for re-surfacing the Bear Creek market road, the county court last Friday ordered that \$1,000 be transferred from the market road reserve fund to the market road maintenance fund.

An item of \$600 was ordered transferred from the general road fund to the Halls creek fund to repair the surface of that county road.

Rural Fire District Proposed —Would Reduce Insurance

Guests at the Lions Club yesterday noon were C. C. Farr, Jack Wigant, of Bandon, and a friend E. B. Black. All three briefly expressed their pleasure at being present.

The principal talk of the noon hour was made by Fire Chief Chas. Gardner, whose subject as announced by the president was, "Fireman Save My Child." Mr. Gardner referred to the annual fire prevention week, now being observed, and urged the Lions and all citizens to aid every effort in reducing the fire hazard.

He then broached a subject which will receive more attention in the next few weeks. It is the establishment of a rural fire district, authorized by state law.

His idea was to have included in the district the country from Riverton, both sides of the river, through Coquille to the county farm, and up both sides of the river to Johnson's Mill.

The county court has authority to establish the district on petition, unless objections are filed, in which event they can call an election. The limit of funds which can be raised by the district annually is \$10,000 and the two mills is the tax limit.

And the reduction in fire insurance rates should save more than the tax increase would amount to. It is worth investigating.

will endure forever. The idea of service to community is noble and imperishable.

Dreams in terms of service, was illustrated by Mr. Barker with several instances which had come under his personal observation. One man who had acquired a competency in the east, surprised and shocked his friends and acquaintances by presenting his huge plant to the workmen who had helped make it what it was.

Another young man with a dream, and such dreams age becoming more frequent, was the head of an insurance company. When a new home office was to be built he purchased many times the amount of land needed and installed a golf course, tennis courts and many other recreational and entertaining features for the employes.

"The new philosophy of business is service," was his challenge to those who consider the acquiring of dollars as necessitating the grinding of labor to the lowest levels.

Speaking of recreation, Mr. Barker said that there is more of it in the United States than anywhere else in the world; more golf is played in Oregon than in France and Germany combined.

"Education is the personification of service," was Mr. Barker's concluding thought, referring to the university where thousands of Oregon youth are securing their training and development for the larger affairs of life. He gave another illustration of a man who sought to have his son enter the university to make the boy a technical successor to the father.

"We told him we were not interested," said Mr. Brown, but added that if the idea of training him for service and helpfulness to his state and country, to the army of people which the man employed, that the university would be glad to have the young man matriculate. They were willing to inculcate the idea of social responsibility in business.

The entire address was on a plane of thought which every man and woman should have heard, and the preaching of which cannot fail to have a most beneficial result in making the business life of the nation "one of service."
