To Start Hot Lunches Monday

The serving of hot lunches to the students of the Lincoln and High School buildings will begin on Monday, October 13. Several of the high school girls have been employed to prepare and serve the lunches which will be sold at the cost of five cents per serving. It is the plan of the department supervising the preparation of the lunches to provide wholesome food at a minimum cost and to supplement cold lunches which the students bring from home with a hot soup or the like. It is to be suggested that students can reduce the cost of their lunch by bringing sandwiches, fruit and simple custard desserts from home and just adding a bowl of soup to make lunch a bit more appetizing and nourishing. However, the lunches are so planned that students who prefer not to bring food from home may secure, besides a hot dish, a salad and a dessert at school.

Following is the suggested lunch menu for the next two weeks:

Monday, October 13—Cream of tomato soup, scalloped cabbage, pineapple and cottage cheese salad, head lettuce salad, cup custard.

Tuesday, Oct. 14—Cream of potato soup, succotash, Waldorf salad, gingerbread and whipped cream.

Wednesday, Oct. 15—Baked beans, celery soup, vegetable salad, lemon pie.

Thursday, Oct. 16—Clam chowder, Spanish rice, shredded lettuce salad, Bavarian cream.

Friday, Oct. 17—Vegetable soup, scalloped salmon, fruit salad, butter-scotch tapioca cream.

Wednesday, Oct. 22—Spaghetti with tomato sauce, cream of pea soup, vegetable salad, floating island.

Thursday, Oct. 23—Scalloped potatoes, fruit salad, apple compote, cookies.

Friday, Oct. 24—Chili Con Carne, noodle soup, perfection salad, rice pudding.
