Arrested at Hallowe'en Party

The police made a raid on the Adams home on Spurgeon Hill where a Hallowe'en party was in progress and took Geo. Dimmick, Aileen Roberts and Chas. Woodruff before Recorder Leslie, where they pleaded guilty to a drunkenness charge and were fined \$10 each.

The officers made a second trip to the house, after receiving additional information and secured 24 bottles of beer. Don Adams pleaded guilty to possession and serving Monday and was fined \$75.

Two others arrested at the party were Lloyd Johnson and a girl of 13. Mr. Leslie transferred the case to Justice Stanley's court where Johnson admitted his guilt of the charge—giving liquor to a minor. He stated that he was guilty but the justice had no option but to bind him over to the grand jury, setting his bail at \$2500.

Johnson offered to marry the girl if that would right his trouble, but the justice informed him that such a procedure was not within his province to permit and he is being held until the new district attorney is ready to accept his waiver of grand jury investigation.
