Marshfield won, 6-0, from North Bend the same day, scoring within the first five minutes of play and not losing the ball before the touchdown. North Bend stiffened after that and in the last half outplayed its heavier opponents. Unless North Bend should win in their Thanksgiving day game, Marshfield has won the county championship.
