**B. P. W. Holds Annual Service Club Banquet**

Our annual Service Club banquet was held at Coquille Hotel November 17. Mr. Compton's staff quite outdid themselves both in cooking and service and from cocktail to pie every bit of our turkey dinner was enjoyed by apparently every diner.

With Mrs. Beyers as leader, various club songs were sung between courses and the guests present were introduced by the club members who were acting as hostesses. These guests were Mrs. Cal Ray and Mrs. Kirat and Messrs. D. F. Thompson, C. C. Farr, Earl Nosler, J. E. Norton, Tracy Leach, W. V. Ferguson, R. L. Stewart and J. P. Beyers. I think I may say that Mrs. Ray, Gold Star mother, was the guest of the evening.

At the close of the banquet the delegate guests were asked to state the particular service, which the club each represented, hoped to render to Coquille.

Judge Thompson, the first speaker, told of the lack of employment, the resulting need of financial help and his hope that private aid might make up for any unavoidable public deficiency resulting from lack of funds.

Mrs. J. E. Norton, representing the Civic Club, spoke of their desire to do away with bill boards; of their beginning departmental work in the club by organizing a music department which hopes to form a choral society in Coquille and of their sponsoring the Camp Fire Girls which now takes the place of the Girl Reserves.

Mr. Farr mentioned what the Chamber of Commerce means to do for the Coquille band but dwelt at greater length on the prospect of an aviation field near here and the federal aid which might be given to such an enterprise if an air mail line touched here.

Mr. Ferguson, president of the Lions, told us of the Torch Honor society organized by them in the high school; of the many kind acts performed for individuals; and of the hope of Coquille Lions to make a swimming pool for the use of our citizens.

Mr. Beyers, speaking for Geo. W. Taylor Sr., who was unable to be present, thought that the outstanding service of the Flower Lovers Club was the organization of the Sunshine Flower club.

Mr. Stewart told of the desire of the American Legion to give friendly help where needed and of their intention to sponsor the Boy Scout movement here.

Mr. Nosler, band master, thanked the B. P. W.'s and other organizations for support given and predicted that we would soon see or rather hear the results of steady practice.

Mr. Leach, president of the Monotony Killers, declared their aim to be of help to any organization or project that needed them.

Mrs. Bryant then introduced Mrs. Ray, who told us of her trip to her son's grave in France. She spoke at length on the great care taken of the Gold Star mothers and the royal hospitality accorded them by the United States government through its officials. Every step of the journey was planned for them and all expenses paid; guards, guides, doctors, nurses, etc., were provided, every need great or trifling was anticipated and no effort was spared to make the journey comfortable and memorable. Mrs. Ray was especially impressed by the few children and young people that she saw and by the hard, laborious lives of the working people. She did not find French people so different from us in dress or appearance but pronounced them 100 years behind the United States in methods of work and mechanical inventions.

The Public and International Relations committee had prepared a peace program but as it was getting late and there was still a business meeting for the club members it was decided to omit this program.

After our visitors had taken their departure a very hilarious business session was held. In spite of the high spirits of certain members we succeeded in voting in three new members and at long last put through a motion for adjournment.

The next B. P. W. meeting will be at K. P. Hall December 1. This is an initiation meeting and Mrs. Bertha Smith requests all members to be present if possible. Those who have not been formally initiated are especially urged to be present and join in the ceremony.
