The tax ratio of Coos county as promulgated by the state tax commission this week remains unchanged at 63 percent the same as last year. Coos was one of the eighteen counties in which the ratios remain the same. Eighteen other counties suffered reductions in their ratios. These ratios are established by the tax commission as the basis for the apportionment of the assessments against public utility

corporations.

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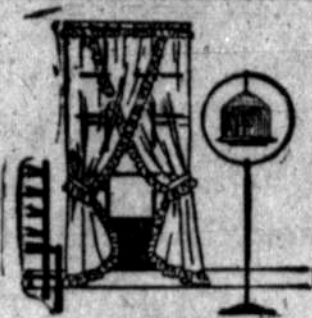
