Contagious Abortion Control

The "Oregon System" for the preention, control, and eradication of Infectious Abortion of dairy cattle will be explained by Dr. B. T. Sims, chief of the Veterinary Department at the State College, to Coos and Curry County dairymen on December 5 and 6, according to word just received at the County Agent's office.

This will be done first at the Kelly dairy at the Smith place on the old Lampa Mountain road west of Arago where a demonstration will be given in bleeding cattle for the abortion test on Friday, December 5 at 1:30 p. m. Dr. Simms will talk on the sys-tem-of prevention, control, and eradi-cation at the city hall in Myrtle Point at 8:00 p. m. on December 5th.
