Boxing Card Tuesday

The Best in Many Months

The promise of an excellent card at the American Legion boxing program Tuesday evening was borne out by the exhibitions of the evening. It was one of the best signed up by Match-maker Roy Watson in the past year.

There was only a fair house but those present saw more action than is usually witnessed in two cards, and four of the bouts were hammer and tongs affairs that had the house in an uproar.

Bud Bryant, weighing 165, had a five-pound advantage over Brownie Buskirk, of Pendleton, but he had no advantage in the boxing, for Brownie had a shade the best of it, although Referee Roy Godartstrom's decision of a draw was not objected to. The Pendleton youth floored Bud twice, once in the fourth with glancing blow to the chin which put the North Bend boy down for the count of nine. He was still groggy when he got up but instead of covering up, rushed in to mix it and escaped further punishment that frame. In the fifth Bud was floored again but came up more quickly. Bud knocked Buskirk down once.

At times the in-fighting was terrific, with short jabs and upper cuts, and fists pumping in like pistons, but neither one could land a haymaker nor was either greatly damaged.

The semi-final six-round go between Big Boy Morgan, of Marshfield, and Joe Reese, colored, of Myrtle Point, was a slower affair. Reese was recently out of the hospital and hardly in condition, but there has never been a fighter in the ring here whose muscles stood out in such bunches as did the colored man's. Morgan was given the decision, to which he was entitled.

In the six-round mix between Kermit Shaw and Kid Hollingsworth, of Bridge, substituting for Corbin Bones, the fans got their money's worth, had there not been another bout on the card. Shaw found a Tartar in the kid, who was making his third fight. He is a logger, white-skinned and fair, and the way he went after Kermit was a caution. He has lots to learn about boxing and defensive work yet but he has a fighting heart and when Shaw landed one on him he mixed it so quickly and furiously that Shaw was forced to cover up time after time.

It became a habit with Shaw to find himself on the main floor of the auditorium for four times the kid rushed him so hard, with punches and shoves that Shaw fell through the ropes and off the platform. Never before in Coquille have two middle weights put up one continuous throwing of gloves for six rounds as these two did. The referee's decision of a draw was not popular, but Hollingsworth inexperience and his not following up advantages caused him to lose the lead he otherwise would have had.

Two clever lightweight, Lew Miller, of North Bend, and Carl Kaner, of Portland, fighting at 125 and 126 pounds, gave a good boxing exhibition and the decision for Miller was proper for he had Kaner in distress frequently with his body blows and nose and mouth punches.

In the second bout of the evening Ellsworth Willett, of Lee, secured the only knockout of the evening, when he put Wildcat Walters out in the second. He had repeatedly floored the wildcat who seemed to have taken a hard one in the first round which stunned him. Willett showed more in this fight than he ever has before and his savage attack surprised the fans who have frequently seen him in action.

The curtain raiser was between two game kids, Bill Kelly, 140, and Lyle Colbert, 150, both of Coquille. By the end of the first round both were tired out, in the second they were doing little damage and by the time the fourth started it was a case of the spirit being willing but the flesh weak. Colbert's size gave him no advantage for Bill kept boring in but Lyle's longer reach saved him a lot of punishment.
