The state highway department is advertising for bids covering the construction of a frame shop building 28x34 feet at Coquille. Bids will be opened at the meeting of the commission in Portland, December 11.

At the same time the commission will open bids on the construction of 13.6 miles of broken stone or crushed

gravel surfacing on the Lakeside-North Bend section of the Roosevelt Coast highway in Coos county. This project, according to Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer, is a part of the commission's program for the immediate completion of the Coast highway, the Waldport-Newport section of which was opened to traffic for the first time only two weeks ago.
