Distribution System of Gas Company Finished

Work has been completed on the gas distribution system in this city by Natural Gas Corporation of Oregon, states J. S. Donaldson, local representative of the company.

Now construction will be put underway very shortly on the gas plant, which should be ready to go into operation some time during the first part of February, according to word received from General Superintendent E. M. Lindsay.

These plants will present a very attractive appearance, states Donaldson, being constructed of red tile with a steel roof. The plant in this city will be about 20x25 ft., and the steel high pressure tank will have a capacity of approximately 15,000 gallons of butane. The storage tank will have a capacity of 12,500 cubic feet of gas, and additional tanks will be added as requirements of service call for them.

The entire property, when com-

pleted, will be surrounded by a seven foot cyclone fence, with either gravel or lawn in front, and all in all will present a very neat appearance.

An extensive gas appliance display will also be opened in this city in ample time for all residents to choose just the appliances best suited to their needs and everything possible will be done to assure all consumers maximum service at all times.

The construction work underway in this city at this time has given additional employment to a number of local men and local purchase of supplies is also being made whenever possible. This means a considerable sum of money is being continually brought into Coquille by this construction work, in addition to the future growth and development which will be made possible through the beginning of gas service in this community.
