Penney Co.'s Managers to Meet

F. W. Martin, manager of the J. C. Penney Co. store in this city, will leave Sunday to attend the annual Spring convention of that organization to be held at Portland.

Owing to the new conditions in the department store field which have been brought about by drastic reductions in commodity prices, the convention, which is usually held in April, has been moved ahead to give all J. C. Penney Co. store managers an opportunity to get full advantages of the new merchandising and price policies of the company.

Price reductions running as high as forty percent in many staple lines of merchandise handled by the organization, have already been announced and further announcements regarding new price and quality standards may be expected, according to Mr. Martin.

He also tells of one of the largest real estate deals consummated in the retail business district in recent years was completed recently when final negotiations were concluded for the lease of the McDermott Building, well known in Seattle as the former Bon Marche location, by the J. C. Penney Company.

The deal involves a figure which may represent approximately two million dollars in rental and the J. C. Penney Company will occupy the entire area of the McDermott Building, located at the northwest corner of Second and Union.

The building has a total frontage on Second Avenue of 120 feet, with six stories above the ground floor and two basements. The total frontage gives 228 feet of show windows.

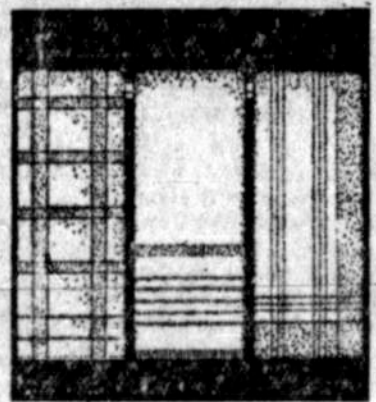
