Judge Thompson expressed six of his reasons for so much child delinquency; they were: poverty, extravagance and waste, suggestive motion pictures, closed autos where much secrecy can be obtained, liquor, and the desire to dress as well or make as good an appearance as others. He urged mothers not to over-dress their children as it set a bad example for some. He stated that home and home community environment had much influence on children.

Valentine Salad

This Valentine Salad is inexpensive and yet is delicious to serve for any afternoon party. It takes the place of salad and dessert and should be accompanied by thin plain sandwiches and coffee.

2 packages red
flavored gelatine
1 pound moist cottage cheese

1 can crushed pineapple (medium size)
1 envelope granulated gelatine
(2 tablespoons)

Heat pineapple and juice to boiling point. Pour over granulated gelatine. Prepare the red, flavored gelatine as instructed on the box. Add cottage cheese to the pineapple mixture and pour into a pan to depth of about one inch. Let set until firmly firm. Over this carefully pour cooled red gelatine. Chill thoroughly, cut in heart shapes, using deep sandwich cutter. Arrange on bed of crisp lettuce; pass whipped cream mayonnaise dressing made by adding whipped cream to an equal amount mayonnaise. Recipe serves 10 to 12 people.
