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Poultry Club Records
 Cecil Laws, charter member of Bandon's 4-H poultry club, has completed a record for the year 1930 that shows in a concrete way the amount of money that can be made from hens even on a small scale.

He started the year with thirty hens and at the close his record shows a profit of \$38.15. He has culled out eight of these old hens and added twenty-eight pullets which now makes him a flock of fifty hens. His statement shows the profit or loss for each month during the year. This statement does not include the prize money that he won at the Coos and Curry county fair this past year nor at the Bandon Poultry Show. Cecil, however, is more proud of the silver trophy cup that was awarded to him as having the outstanding exhibit at the Bandon Show.

His record for this last year can be a good example for other poultry club members or boys and girls interested in poultry as well as to older people who are interested in making a living in the poultry business.

The Oregon State College recommends a minimum of 400 hens as an economic unit where poultry is carried on in connection with other farm enterprises. They also recommend that anyone wishing to make poultry raising their major enterprise should carry at least 2500 laying hens or as many as 4000 in order to make it a paying enterprise. One man can care for 4000 laying hens and make a reasonable labor income. The above statement proves that with proper handling under last year's conditions one dollar per hen can be cleared during the year.

For members of 4-H clubs it is recommended that the member carry a large enough project so that enough profit can be realized to make it a business venture for the boy who is enrolled. Fifty to one hundred laying hens should be the unit carried by a successful poultry club member.

Marine Corps Now Recruiting
 The United States Marine Corps has resumed recruiting and are accepting a limited number of applicants for enlistment during the month of February.

The qualifications for enlistment in the Marine Corps are that all applicants must be at least 19 years of age, of good character, and qualified to pass the required physical and mental examination, be at least 69 inches tall and be an American citizen.

The U. S. Marines are now serving in Cuba, Haiti, Guam, China, Hawaiian Islands, Virgin Islands, Panama, Nicaragua, also on board ships of the U. S. fleets and in the navy yards on both coasts.

Marines enlisted on the west coast are sent to San Diego, California, where they are trained in military duties and the use of firearms, trench mortars, light and heavy artillery.

The Marine Corps maintains several aviation units which any enlisted man may make application for.
