Tobe Stenson, another new man, at second, also showed up like a stone-wall on defense, but could not connect safely at the bat.

The old stand-bys, Woodyard, Stewart, Brundage, Roper, Pulford, Fischer and Gilbert are going as well this season as they did last, which is plenty good. And that reminds us, Bill Mansell disagrees with what the Sentinel said last week about Bill Stewart. He claims, and is probably right, that Bill is a better shortstop than "Cutie" Slade was when he cavorted for Coquille in the short patch.

The never-quit attitude of the team which pulled the game out of the fire in the eighth proved that the boys are playing the game this year, and that the Loggers are in for another good season.
