Opening Through Hancock Mt.

The hole is now through Hancock mountain on the Scottsburg-Drain road and all that remains to be done is to enlarge the bore to the full size. The pioneer tunnel is eight feet square. The completed tunnel is 20 feet in height and wide enough to carry two times of widest vehicles allowed by the Oregon state laws.

It is expected that the work will proceed much more rapidly than in the past for the reason that the tunnel will be better ventilated and that there is a better chance to work when it is possible to pass clear through the tunnel.

Work on two bridges near the tunnel is progressing rapidly. The tunnel contract must be completed by November 15, and it is hoped that travel through it will be possible the coming winter.—Port Umpqua Courier.

18-Year Old Boy Shoots Self

Meredith Ward, 18 years, lies in the Mast hospital at the point of death, says the Myrtle Point Herald, as the result of a gunshot wound self-inflicted at his home on Breitenbusch creek, between Myrtle Point and Bridge late Sunday afternoon. The ball entered the lad's right side near the lower portion of the thorax and ranged upward, probably passing through the liver. His condition is such that the full extent of the wound cannot be determined, though his physician holds out no hope for his recovery.

Meredith is a son of Mrs. Gertrude Ward, and the family live on Breitenbusch creek where Meredith has been conducting a small logging camp. Sunday afternoon as two boys were driving along the highway Meredith came stumbling onto the road and fell in front of their car. They helped him up and called Dr. Mast. The lad was later taken to the Mast hospital. According to reports the lad became despondent over a love affair. There is another story that he was shot by someone and does not want to tell the story. This theory is advanced because of the location of the wound, it being argued that one would not be able to hold the gun in a position to inflict a wound like the one in the boy's body.

The Ward family formerly lived on Catching creek. His father died several years ago. The family are among the early pioneers of this section.
