Ellie Widby left last week for his home at Silver City, New Mexico, after several weeks' visit with relatives.

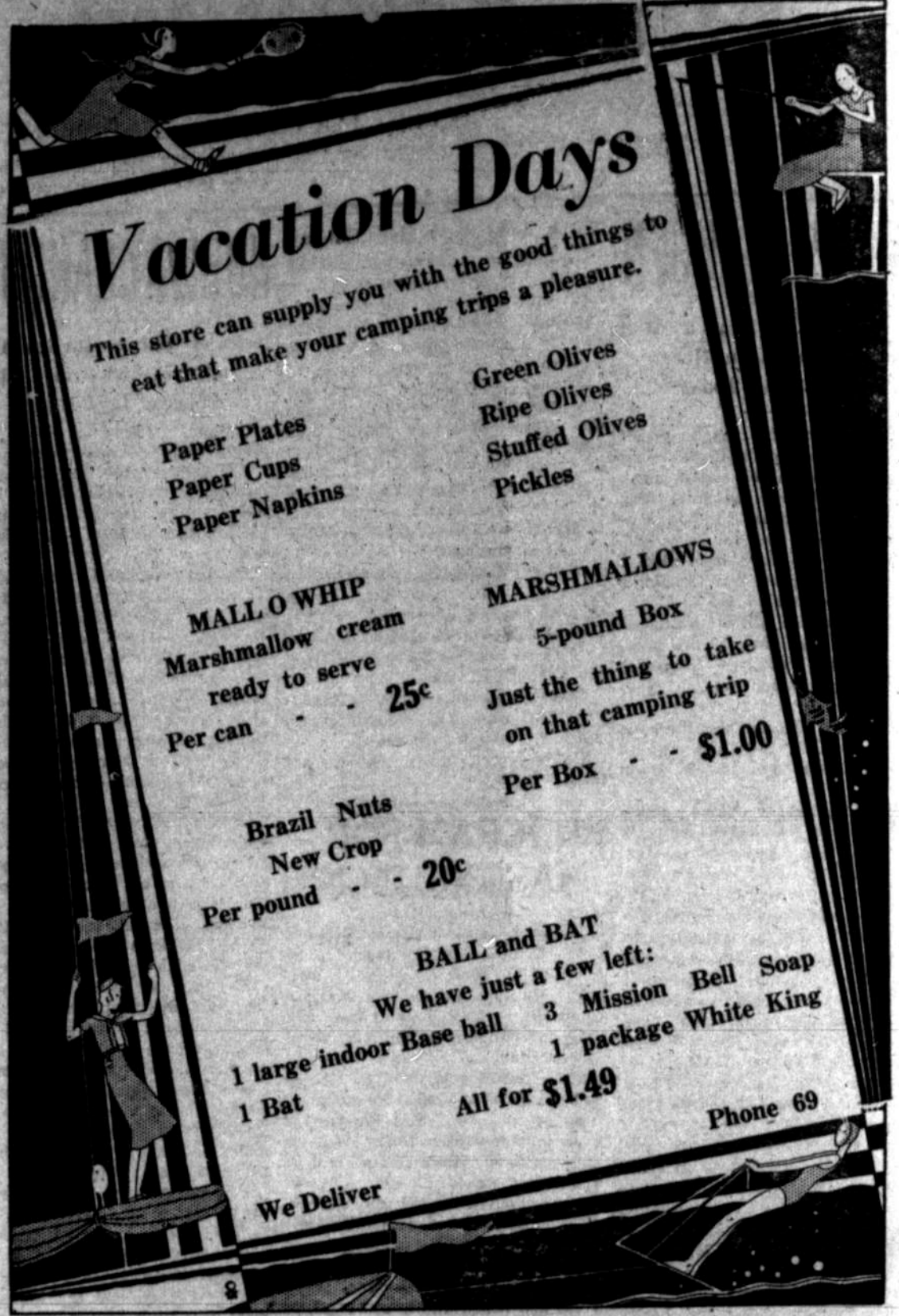

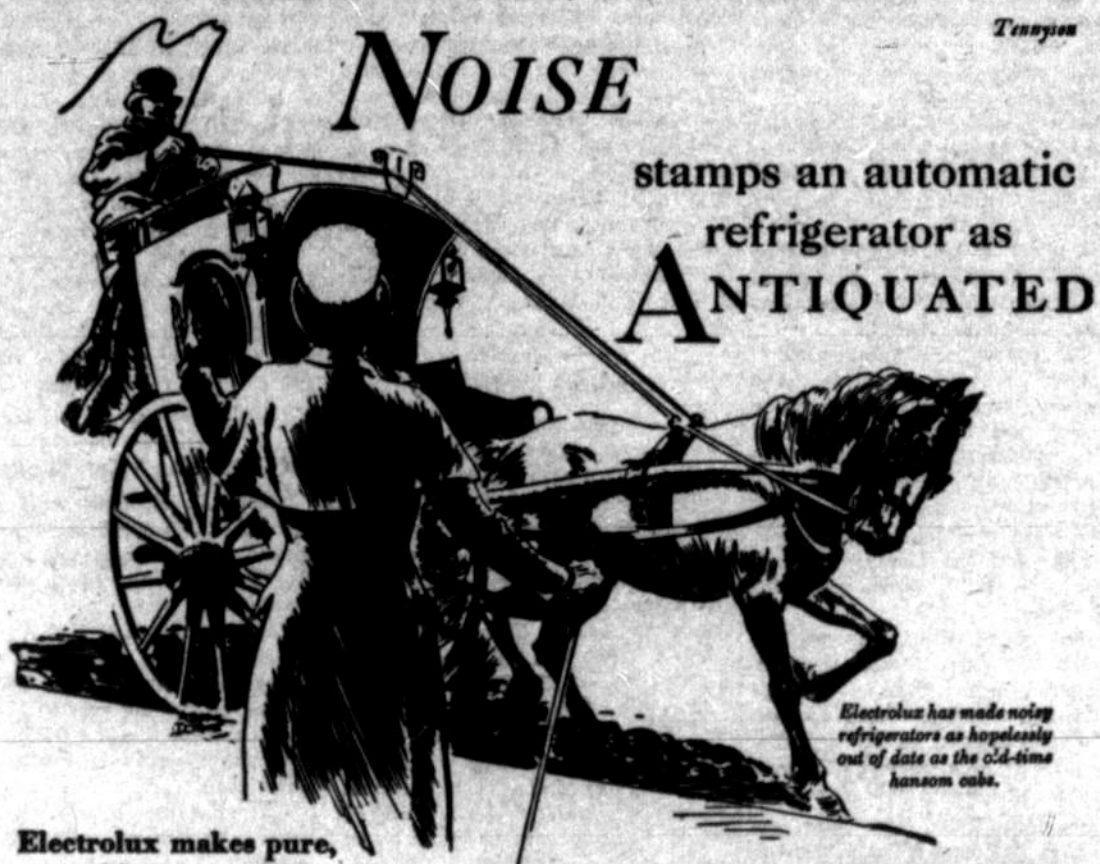
