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Kight Family Reunion

On Sunday, July 26th, the Kight families and relatives, held a picnic near Riverton, on the old place where they first lived, upon coming to Coos county—46 years ago. Thirty-five members were present to enjoy the splendid dinner, which had been prepared by the different ladies in the party. The afternoon was spent in visiting and in the talking over old times and the many changes which had taken place in the valley in those seemingly short few years.

Forty-six years ago, three families in Kansas—the Sells, the Andersons, and Kights—very near to each other through marriage ties, chartered an overland emigrant train for Fresno, California. After visiting relatives in Fresno a few days, they all came north on a steamship to Coos Bay. From there they and their household effects were taken to Coquille by stage. Coquille was a very small place at that time. The next morning their things were loaded into boats and the families came down the river to what is now Riverton.

At that time Riverton was just a large ranch owned by a Mr. Truett. Their boats docked at an improvised landing on the Thrush place, just above where the present Riverton ferry operates. With the kindly help and assistance of the Thrush family, they moved to what was known as the Quigley place, in back of Riverton about a mile. And it was at this old place the picnic was held Sunday, though no buildings are now standing to mark the place.

In those early days there were no roads between Coquille and Bandon, no telephone or power lines. The only means of communication were by boats on the Coquille river.

The Kights bought property adjoining the Quigley place. The Sells located below Riverton. The Andersons acquired property on what is now called Fishtrap, near Coquille. At the present time, one member of each of those families is living on each of the old homes, which were acquired so long ago.

Name Various Spelt

Not Government Owned
