Mining Excitement at Powers
Reaches the Acute Stage

Under a Powers date line, a correspondent sends the following gold mining news to the Myrtle Point Herald:

Excitement runs high in Powers, Oregon's newest mining center, as the time approaches when Pepper Bros., the district's biggest operators, will by actual mining prove whether their new machine will recover the elusive placer gold that lies on the bedrock along the South Fork river seven miles south of Powers. The brothers spent months in proving the ground, and just a few days ago a test hole was sunk near where the machinery is installed, with results not announced. However there are many knowing winks and nods. The air is surcharged with enough expectancy to whet the appetite of the most seasoned miner, and the woods here right now are full of the old-timers. Goldfield, Tonopah, Seven Troughs, Jarbridge and the rest of the Nevada gold centers of a quarter of a century ago had nothing on Powers as it exists right now. There are old-timers who know the Johnson creek diggings in their palmist days. They know here is "gold in them thar hills," from actual experience, and they know what is going to happen here and all over southern Oregon if the Pepper boys get the big results that are expected.

Pepper Bros., who came from Syracuse, N. Y., have spent to date approximately \$100,000 of their own money. This is enough to satisfy the most skeptic that the boys mean business. They are business men who earned the money they are spending, and it is to be presumed they know how to spend it. For months they explored the ground. The freight bill alone on their machinery cost over \$3,000, which is more than some "mining" companies spend in developing a mine. A wagon road has been built a distance of six miles along the South Fork to get the machinery over. They stop at no expense where time is involved. When they want to communicate with their offices in New York they "hit" the telephone. One instance of a week ago shows how they operate. They had two large trucks here on the job. A third was on the way out. There was a ring of the phone. "Hello," came the voice over the wire, "this is the driver of your truck and we are here at Green River, Wyo. Our load is so heavy we will have to leave some here." "No, don't do that; we'll send another truck out from here to meet you," was the reply from the Powers end. The other truck went out and considerable time was saved is the stuff on the truck in Wyoming was needed in the first start in actual mining work.

Mining has become contagious with most of the inhabitants of this one-time strictly loggers camp. Coming at a time when men are out of a job the mining excitement has sent many to the hills in search of the yellow metal—in the sands along the river, while others are seeking it in the places harder to get, the ledges. As a result the hills are alive with people. Some are panning and others are working with pick and drill and blasting powder. Then there are others who have had claims located for years and they, having good prospects, are making roads, or improving the roads they had, so that mining men looking for properties to do development work on will be able to get into the country and see what there is offered.

As in all prospecting camps, every man carries a sample of the rock from his claim, and many of them can tell just what is in it though they have never had an assay made. The writer has met men in mid-stream who stopped and sketched with their walking stick a diagram of their claims, pointing out an open cut here, a shaft there, and show the place they have selected for their mills.

While some have just the rock of doubtful or uncertain value, there are a number who carry the real thing in the yellow metal. E. F. Keller, of the Bank of Powers, has three pocket pieces the total value of which is around \$50, and these shiny heavy pieces he passes from one hand to the other, much like a rancher playing with a handful of wheat, as he tells you of the bright prospect of the mining excitement being the means that will bring about a highway between Powers and Grants Pass.

There is not a day passes that some old mining man or a representative of some real mining company does not arrive in Powers to see what is going on. Samples have been taken of a number of promising properties, and while Pepper Bros. may prove the district from a placer mining standpoint, there is a bright prospect that there will be considerable activity this summer in the quartz claims.

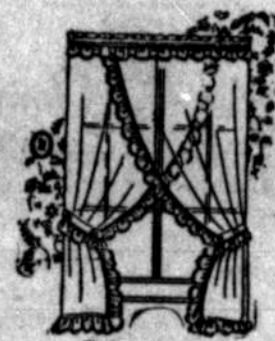
