Rare Specimen of Bird

Another rare specimen has been added to the collection of rare birds for Oregon. On Dec. 14 Overton Dowell, Jr., who is a local collector of birds, obtained a female Old Squaw duck near Florence on the river below town. Mr. Dowell reports this is the fourth duck of this species to have been reported for Oregon. The Old Squaw is a duck of the Arctic regions, visiting along the Arctic coast to Greenland, wintering as far south as Washington on the west coast and on the Atlantic as far south as North Carolina. Billion Gallons Gas Bootlegged

One billion of the 15 billion gallons of gasoline consumed annually in the United States escapes taxation through the operation of tax evaders and racketeers, Dr. Clyde L. King, Pennsylvania's Secretary of Revenue, told the American Petroleum Institute in a paper presented here before the Institute's annual meeting. This represents a loss of around \$40,000,000 per year, the average gasoline tax now being slightly more than four cents per gallon.
