WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?

Now that the holidays are over, there are many who are wondering how to properly care for their Christmas plants particularly the beautiful Poinsettia. In the "Flower Grower" for December, 1931, I found the following instructions: "Be sure to water freely, especially if kept in a hot, dry room. If you do not do this the leaves will drop, if it has come from the humid air of the greenhouse. If it has been home-grown, the change will not be so great and this will help to keep the blossoms fresh and more lasting. If the plant sheds its leaves after through blooming, do not think it dead, and discard it. It is just taking a rest. In the spring, prune well, cutting the old stalk back within a few inches of the ground or soil. Now it can be set out in the ground if desired, and repotted in the autumn. September is a good time to do this. Use good soil and have good drainage. Keep it in a sunny situation and encourage it to grow, and then bring it into the house and you can have it in bloom for another Christmas. This plant requires a temperature between 65 to 80 degrees to do well." How simple those directions are!

Among my ramblings I have often seen our beautiful Christmas cactus in full bloom and others rather sickly looking. Upon inquiring about their care from the successful grower, I have found they all had a "system" for raising them and their instructions were along the lines of the following item, also taken from the same number of the "Flower Grower": "The Christmas cactus is a very satisfactory Christmas plant. If grown properly it will be a mass of scarlet bloom about the holiday season. One should remember that, like many winter-blooming plants, it should have a season of rest to mature its growth for the following season; the best period for this rest is during July, August and September; and then it should be watered freely for a time to get the new growth well started. Then give less water for a time, and plenty of sunlight. The best soil for this plant is about one part sand to two parts

good rich garden loam; and there should be good drainage." These plants should never be stood in a saucer of water for like all other cacti, they don't like wet feet.

The other day I visited the office of our county agent. This place is a veritable gold mine to the garden lover as well as to the farmer. I don't believe people really understand what this place means to the public. It isn't for the farmer alone, although of course, that part is particularly stressed; but there are on display and for distribution, bulletins from our State Agricultural College, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and many others. By visiting this place frequently one can pick a very valuable library just for the asking. If you don't know just what you want, tell your troubles to either the agent or the stenographer and either will gladly help you. I found several bulletins that are of particular value to us here. These bulletins are all from the U. S. Department of Agriculture: "Farmers' Bulletin No. 1381, 'Herbaceous Perennials' by L. F. Mulford. This is finely illustrated and gives the use, arrangement, culture and propagation of hardy plants. Kinds to use, adaptability of various plants to our region, common names, etc. In fact, it covers the subject very fully and in plain language.

"Farmers' Bulletin No. 1370, 'Dahlias for the Home,' by B. Y. Morrison, will appeal to the dahlia lover. Cultivation and propagation are thoroughly covered and it is also well illustrated.

The iris lover is well cared for in another bulletin, No. 1406. It is called, 'Garden Irises,' and is also by Morrison. This covers the iris field so fully that it seems to me to be the most complete treatise for general use. It is not technical as are so many works on this subject.

"Farmers' Bulletin, No. 750, 'Roses for the Home,' is also fine. This is another by F. L. Mulford. In it is a map of the U. S. divided into various regions and the best roses for each region are given. It is also very clear and understandable. They are constantly receiving new bulletins at this office so don't quit with just one visit.

Remember our next club meeting is January 19th and the cup contest will be winter bouquets of dried or fresh material, no artificial.

At Liberty Next Week

Lilyan is more hard-boiled—and she continues her efforts to mulct Eugene Pallette, wealthy banker, of his life's savings.

Kay's romance with McCrea faces the rocks when she tells him that she is already married to Anderson Lawler. But all their difficulties are smoothed out at the finish, amid much general merry-making on the part of the other players and not a little leg-pulling on the part of the resourceful Lilyan.

It's a great show; fresh, lively and piquant. Recommended to all.
