The New Non-Partisan Judiciary Election Law

Following are the important features of the non-partisan judiciary law adopted by the last legislature which is aimed to take judicial positions out of politics, both supreme court and circuit court judges being voted for at primary and general elections without any reference to their political affiliations:

At both the primary and general elections there is a separate ballot, designated "Judiciary Ballot," on which appear only the names of the persons who are candidates for judicial offices, without reference to political parties or party affiliations.

If not to exceed two persons file as candidates for any one vacancy, department or position, "the name of such person or persons shall not be placed upon the primary ballot but such person or persons shall be the nominee or nominees for such office." If more than two persons file as candidates for any one vacancy, department or position, the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes for said vacancy, department or position, become the nominees for such office, unless one of the candidates receives a majority of all votes cast for such office, in which case his name appears as the only nominee for such office on the separate "Judiciary Ballot" at the general election, with one space "left following such name in which the voter may insert the name of any person for whom he wishes to cast his ballot."

The positions of the members of the Supreme Court are designated by numbers from 1 to 7 inclusive, and candidates for the Supreme Court must, in their petitions, designate the position they seek. At the coming election there are two vacancies in the Supreme Court to fill,--positions numbered 2 and 3.

No slogan or other identification appears on the ballot after the names of candidates for judicial offices, therefore, in the future, "By their works (not words) ye shall know them."

Once more the tax gatherer is abroad in the land. Approximately 70,000 income and intangible tax blanks will be put into the mails addressed to that many prospective taxpayers during the next week, the tax commission has announced. The tax is due and payable before April 1.

The county treasurer and not the county court is responsible for the safekeeping of county funds, Attorney General Van Winkle has ruled. In other words the county courts can not tell the treasurer what to do with the funds in his possession.

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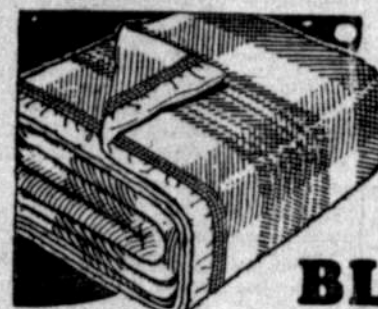

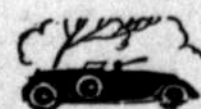

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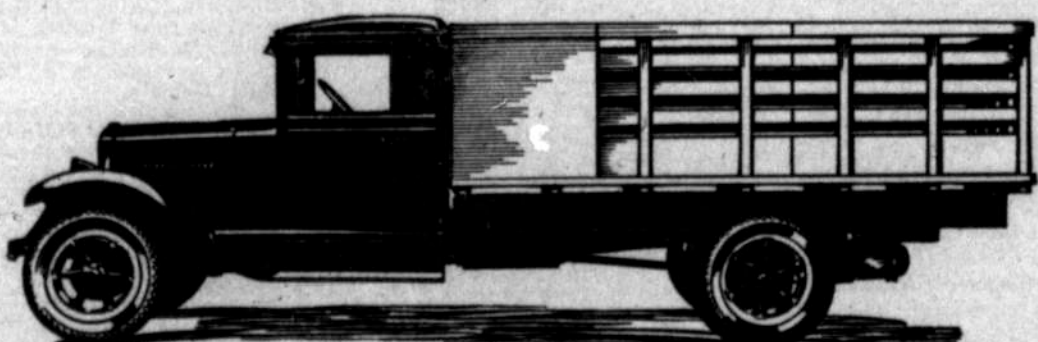
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
