"Victory Day" Celebrated

Prohibition's twelfth birthday, known as "Victory Day," was generally celebrated throughout the county with suitable programs.

Mrs. Ada Jolley, of Portland, state president of the W. C. T. U., gave a splendid address to a large audience at the Pioneer Church, Sunday evening, her subject being, "No Compromise." Everyone present clearly understood that the prohibition forces will take no backward step or compromise with any group working to break down state or federal prohibition.

She presented the Challenge to the Wets, from the National W. C. T. U., which was, "We challenge the wet to solve the liquor problem with anything better than total abstinence; we challenge the wets to produce a better educational program than the facts concerning alcohol as divulged by science; we challenge the wets to substitute something better than law observance. We challenge them to produce a program of liquor regulation which liquor men will obey and which can be guaranteed as a remedy for drunkenness, vice, lawlessness, corruption and waste. For twelve years the wets have sneered at prohibition. What have they to offer?" Mrs. Jolley is visiting all unions of the county this week.

\$50,000 Where It Was Needed

On Jan. 1, charity balls were conducted by the Loyal Order of Moose all over the United States and prizes totalling \$150,000 were offered to ticket purchasers. tainment.

Dean Philip A. Parsons, of the U. of O. School of Applied Science, spoke to the members for an hour or more, most entertainingly, on the subject of community service, a department organized at the university twelve years ago, which is supported in the main by private donations, and for which very little of the taxpayers' money is used.

As a result of his work, which is to train social workers for positions where they can help the unfortunate members of society to adjust themselves, Dean Parsons is a member of the Child Welfare Commission of Oregon.

Not only is his department a training school, but his office is a clearing school through which pass social service problems from all over the state. The study of the causes of juvenile delinquency is one feature of the applied social science program.

The reason for Dean Parsons' visit to Coos county at this time fairly illustrates another important part of the work his department is doing, and that will in time come to be utilized by small communities generally.

The night before Mr. Parsons had conferred with Al Bezosky on plans for a stage in the community hall at Gravel Ford, for a dining room and a men's club room there also. On Thursday evening he met with the people of Arago to help them map out a program of community enterprises, not business, but along cultural lines, making the daily life of the citizens happier and producing a satisfaction with life that is all too often absent.

Oregon is and always will be, outside of a few industrial centers, an agricultural state. It has the natural attractions which tend to make men and women enjoy life, and it is in the service of these small community centers that Dean Parsons believes the real work of his department at the university will function.

He left a thought with the Chamber of Commerce which every town in the county would do well to consider. Build a strong attachment with the community clubs, take an interest in and attend their meetings, offer such co-operation as they may desire. A fraternal spirit, a willingness to help the other fellow, will do wonders toward building up in Oregon the most contented citizenry in the world.

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Game Commission Meets Sportsmen Here Last Night

in the waters of Rock Creek which flows into the Middle Fork of the Coquille river near the Houghtaling place, Big Creek and other streams in Coos county where passing has been eliminated.

That the State Game Commission be requested to clear suitable land around the Bandon hatchery for the purpose of permitting the erection of holding pens for the breeding of game birds.

That suitable legislation be advocated by the State Game Commission declaring wild house cats nuisances and permitting the same to be shot on any uninclosed lands within the State of Oregon; that the laws prohibiting the shooting of firearms on highways be eliminated to permit the extermination of such cats.

That the State Game Commission be requested to keep a game warden on duty in Coos county the year around instead of withdrawing such wardens during the spring season for duty on the Clackamas river and other streams in Oregon.

That parties issuing licenses be authorized to issue permits for the shipping of fish within the state.

That the State Game Commission be requested to advocate the enactment of suitable legislation permitting the taking by automobile or other motor vehicle carrying or transporting out of the State of Oregon game fish or game birds or animals into adjoining states or any other state which do not permit such game fish, game birds or animals to be so taken, carried or transported from such state into the state of Oregon.

That Coos county sportsmen protest to the State Game Commission and the Superintendent of State Police the lack of enforcement by the state police, except those delegated to enforce the fish and game laws specifically, of the fish and game laws of the state of Oregon.

In objecting to taking of all game wardens to the Clackamas river in the spring for patrol duty, Mr. Liljeqvist said that in Coos county the commission has stationed a deputy warden who is second to none in the state and wished that another like him could be sent here. He referred to Clint Hearing.

Alton Grimes, president of the Fat Elk Duck Club, read the following recommendations as decided upon by that club:

At a meeting of the Fat Elk Duck Club, held on January 5th, we recommend to you the following for your careful consideration:

That the open season for ducks be from November 15th to January 1st, inclusive, and that the bag limit be ten birds.

That the bag limit on trout be 30 fish as at present, and that all fish caught, regardless of size, be retained and counted.

That more pond room be provided at the Bandon Hatchery, to the end that fry be held until legal size before liberating.

That a Cutthroat trout egg-taking station be established on some suitable stream in Coos county.

That the open season on Black Tail Deer in Game District No. 1 be from August 15th to October 1st.

That Kingfishers, Blue Heron and Fish Ducks be not protected at any season of the year.

The Sentinel would like to go further and report the talks made by others of the visitors and by home folks, but the deadline is reached and the paper must go to press.

The others who spoke were Commissioner Silven, Art Fish, Capt. Chas. McClees, Chester E. McCarty, deputy attorney general who attends to the commission's legal affairs; Lewis McGeorge and Dr. C. W. Endicott, of Marshfield; Ed Gallier, of Bandon; H. A. Schroeder, of Myrtle Point; A. H. Powers, of Powers; John and Lans Leneve, of Coquille; and L. A. Liljeqvist who made a strong appeal for commercial fishing on the Rogue.

Court Reporter Begg Killed

Geo. Begg, court reporter for the Coos county circuit court for the past six years, died in a Salem hospital Monday morning. Death was due to a collision on the highway with a truck the night before and he did not regain consciousness after the accident.

In an automobile accident in Marshfield two years ago, Mr. Begg lost the sight of one eye, and that may have had something to do with the last fatal collision, or he may have fallen asleep at the wheel.

Mrs. Begg died in January last year at Yakima. He is survived by one son and three daughters.

Marshfield Bank Closes

The Bank of Southwestern Oregon at Marshfield, the oldest banking institution in the county, having been originally founded as the Flanagan & Bennett Bank, failed to open its doors Monday morning and is now in the hands of the state banking department.

Frozen assets, on which the bank could not realize, was the cause of the suspension. The officers and directors of the institution and other county bankers wrestled with the problem all day last Sunday, trying to figure some means of saving the bank, but eventually all hope of consolidation or help from outside institutions had to be given up.

It will be three or four months before dividend checks can be mailed to depositors, but one of the defunct bank's officers stated yesterday that the depositors would receive 100 cents

on the dollar before the final dissolution of the corporation was effected.
