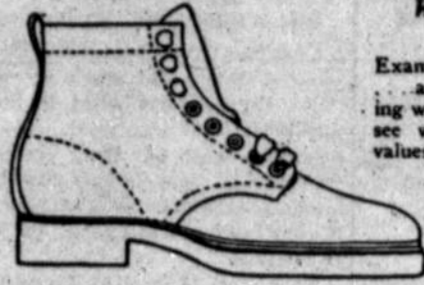

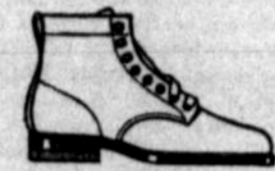

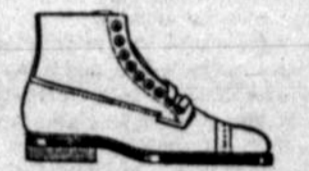

Legendary Horn Highly Valued by Hungarians

The town council of Jaszbereny, Hungary, would not lend the famous Lehel horn to the Byzantine exhibition in Paris until the prime minister guaranteed its return. According to legend, this beautifully carved horn was originally the property of Lehel, the son of Tas, one of the conquerors who invaded Hungary under Arpad. Lehel blew a blast on his horn just before the battle in which the Hungarians defeated the Bulgars under Prince Zalan. At Augsburg in 955 the Hungarians were defeated and Lehel captured and executed. Just before his death Lehel asked for permission to blow one more blast on the horn which had stood him in good stead on so many occasions. The request being granted, Lehel blew the horn and then cracked the skull of the emperor's son-in-law, Conrad, with it, shouting, "In the next world you shall be my servant." The Hungarians used to say that the horn lost its voice with the death of Lehel, but Gyula Kaldy, the composer, exploded that myth in 1893 when he succeeded in blowing an alarm on it. Not since 1867, when it was taken to the coronation of Francis Joseph as emperor, has the horn left Jaszbereny.—Pathfinder Magazine.

Islands Thrown Up in South Atlantic Ocean

In a few hundred thousand years, a whole new archipelago like Japan may emerge from the south Atlantic ocean. This forecast has been made by Rev. Frederick W. Sohon, Georgetown university seismologist, after reports of the discovery of two new islands in the region, coupled with simultaneous seismograph records showing earth tremors that might have emanated from the same territory. The islands appeared off the coast of Brazil, and at first some scientists suggested that they might mean the reappearance of the so-called "lost continent of Atlantis." Father Sohon said there is a ridge along the ocean bed equidistant between South America and Africa, but if there ever was a continent there, it had been completely destroyed. The modern development, he believes, is the result of thousands of years of erosion, sending rock from the mountains down to the continental shelf of the Americas. This, he said, might pile up so much weight that the pressure would cause a ridge in the ocean bed.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

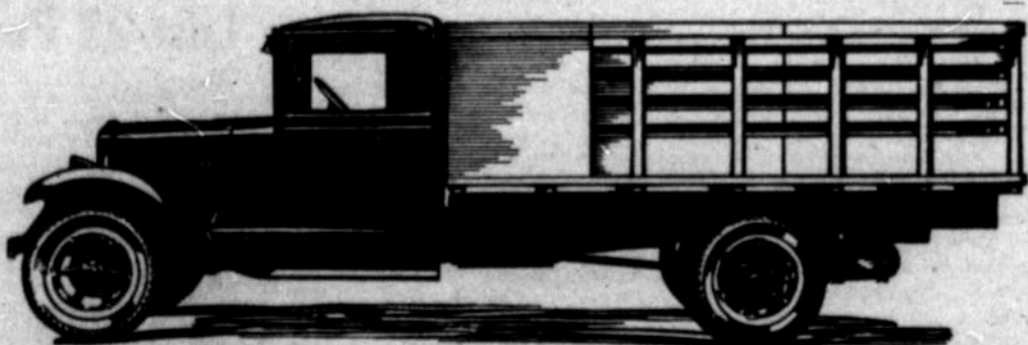

26 Feet of Snow Has Fallen at Crater Lake

In keeping with the general heavy snowfall in the high mountain region, reports from Crater Lake National Park reveal that approximately 26 feet have fallen there so far this season. Mild weather, warm winds and rain have caused the depth to settle and disappear until now there is between 12 and 14 feet in the rim area and 10 feet at Government Camp. This is in excess of the depth for the entire season last year.

When the spring thaw arrives, the resultant water is expected to make a perceptible change in the lake level, which had suffered somewhat from abnormal seasons the past two or three years, and maintain a larger flow of water in streams emanating from the 269 square miles of park area.

Increased Use of Wireless

Wireless messages between Sweden and the United States are steadily increasing and the first year's income of the Grimeton station on Sweden's west coast, which communicates direct with New York, was twice the anticipated amount, according to the annual report recently filed with the royal board of telephones and telegraphs. A year ago this service was officially introduced by King Gustav and President Coolidge with an exchange of messages. The same station also sends messages across Russia and Asia to China and Japan, and countries adjoining Sweden use it for their foreign telegrams.
