An interesting feature of the Garden Club meeting Wednesday evening was a short talk by Mr. Cooper of the Myrtle Point Greenhouse. His subject was, "Plants for rock gardens." A rock gardener is inevitably a collector. Or perhaps it would be more correct to say that a gardener who has in him the collecting urge is certain to find in rock gardening, more than in other phases of the craft, an outlet for his special interests and instincts.

Ordinary gardening is a more or less passive occupation, but rock gardening is distinctly active and so is bound to appeal strongly to persons of imagination and of keen curiosities. In it they find full scope for their natural love of gardening, of searching out the obscure. Mr. Cooper went on to name several splendid plants to have in our rockeries, such as: Sunrose, which in color is red, pink, white, and yellow; Mepta (Lavender); Heather (pink lavender, white); Campanulas, of the bell flower family (blue and white). He also gave many helpful suggestions about the best kind of soil for the raising of these plants.

To the large attendance which gathered at Mrs. C. E. Huling's residence, this talk came at a most opportune time when everyone is thinking of planting. During the meeting each member told what part of their garden they enjoyed the most. The next meeting of the Garden Club will be at Mrs. B. Kring's on March 22.
