They were not only scared but they were terrified and the killing of their two big chiefs taught them that we were dangerous. I have often thought that our escape was due as much to their fear of us as to our good luck. I can look back over the long stretch of years and feel a generous pride that none of my party were killed.

I know not if any of my old comrades are living now. I was the youngest one in the party and I have passed my three score years and ten. If any of them are living, "God's blessings on them;" if they have crossed the great Divide, then "Farewell."

Nearly all of the old pioneers of Oregon are gone. No braver, bigger-hearted, or truer set of pioneers ever blazed the way for the march of civilization than they who, "Belonged to the legion that never were listed, They carried no banner nor crest;

But, split in a thousand detachments, Were breaking the ground for the rest.

My task is done, and I claim no other merit for these recollections than that of truth.

Civil Service Examinations

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that until April 19 it will accept applications for the position of guard-attendant in the Medical Hygiene Division of the United States Public Health Service, for duty at Federal prisons throughout the United States.

To Combat Earwig Pest

The earwig parasite which has been so successfully increased at the Portland Insectory under the direction of entomologists of the Oregon State College will be widely distributed in western Oregon. It is apparent from the interest already shown. Orders have been received at the College for colonies of parasitized earwigs from 15 western Oregon communities, according to information received at the office of the county agent.

The earwig has apparently been kept in control in Europe by this same parasite. So effective is the parasite considered that annual shipments of the fly have been made to British Columbia and to New Zealand in an effort to curb these pests. Importations from Europe are no longer necessary in Oregon as the technique has been developed whereby the parasites can be increased in large numbers. This is being done at the Portland Insectory under the direction of R. E. Dimick, entomologist of the Oregon Experiment Station. To provide colonies of parasitized earwigs to communities which desire them on a cost basis, plans have been made to speed up the propagation process this year.

In the beach resort towns, particularly, where it is difficult if not impossible to conduct organized and sustained campaigns, it is thought that this parasite will be of advantage in keeping the obnoxious pest in control.

The parasite is a fly and when it is ready to lay eggs it seeks out a place where earwigs are hiding. It lays an egg close to the earwig. This egg hatches into a little maggot in thirty seconds. The maggot crawls toward the resting earwig, attaches itself to it, beginning the end of that earwig.

Colonies of the parasite, which will be available for release next summer to various communities outside Multnomah county, will consist of 2,000 male earwigs each of which will carry a parasitic maggot.

Results from the parasite liberations cannot be expected until the parasite has been able to build up in numbers under natural conditions.

Orders for the colonies will be taken at the county agent's office.

Moving Back to Portland

When the present state administration took over the reins of government it was announced that the state capital, which little by little has been moving to Portland, would be returned to Salem and that hereafter official business of the state would be transacted in the capital city. In the consolidation of the several departments in the department of agriculture a few offices which had been maintained in the metropolis were brought to Salem. A few meetings of the state highway commission were held in Salem over the protest of contractors and other interests. The board of higher education also met in the capital a few times. Then things began to drift back into the old routine. The highway commission returned to its Portland meetings. The board of higher education did likewise. And last week a meeting of the state board of control was held in Portland when it was found necessary to transact some important state business at a time when two members of the board happened to be in that city. All of which, apparently, goes to prove that regardless of good intentions or administration promises, Portland as the center of the state's population will continue to be the center of much of the state's official business activity.
