If variety is the spice of life, RKO-Radio Pictures' all-star rollicking comedy "Girl Crazy" which comes to the Liberty Theatre Sunday is a snappy seasoned entertainment dish. 100 Barrels Flour Coming Soon

Red Cross Chapters through the United States are now distributing government owned wheat in the form of flour to needy families, and have requisitioned 1,137,953 barrels of flour as of April 8, according to word received by Mrs. Ida Owen of the local chapter.

Orders for livestock feed for drought areas on the same date totaled 137,194 tons. Chapters ordering flour number 1,755 and those seeking livestock feed number 289.

The local Red Cross chapter has requisitioned 100 barrels of flour for the first shipment, which will be stored in the vacant room of the Sentinel building and passed out on authority of the local Red Cross committee—Mrs. J. R. Bunch, Mrs. Ida K. Owen, Mayor J. Arthur Berg and N. C. Kelley.

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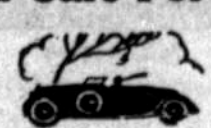
