TWO DELIVERIES**State Truck Operators Organize**

Wm. Weekley, of the Wm. Weekley Logging Co.; Glenn McKay, of Keller, McKay & Gheer; Henry Bryant, of Myrtle Point; and P. J. Rooney, of the P. J. Rooney Auto Co., returned from Salem this morning after attending a meeting before the State Highway Commission in company with several other mill and truck operators. Preliminary to their appearance before the Highway Commission, the delegation met at 10 o'clock at the Marion Hotel and organized the Oregon Mill & Truck Operators Association. Fred Walters, of Eugene, was elected president and E. R. McCormick, Corvallis, secretary and treasurer, which men in turn appointed directors to represent the different districts, one for Tillamook-Seaside-Astoria district, Multnomah district, Albany-Salem-Corvallis district and one for the Klamath Falls-Grants Pass district. Mr. Weekley of the Wm. Weekley Logging Co., was appointed for this district, which comprises Coos-Curry, parts of Douglas and Lane counties.

The State Highway Commission contemplated reducing the present maximum load from 17,000 pounds to 14,000 pounds and also reducing the speed limits from 35 to 25 miles per hour and limiting the length of logs and poles to be hauled to 35 feet, instead of 65 feet at the present time. The object of the Oregon Mill & Truck Operators' Association, which was organized, is for the purpose of co-operating with the State Highway Commission and state police to see that the present laws are enforced and that there will be no overloading or speeding in excess of the 35 mile limit, which now exists.

Smith-Hughes Notes

The Smith-Hughes Department of Agriculture has been busy the past few weeks and will be even more so between now and the close of school. The officers of the Future Farmers of America have appeared before several granges and civic bodies. The F. F. A. five male quartette has taken part in these meetings and will appear again during national music week. Thursday, Mr. Cuning, the adviser, with Harry Helmkin, Darrell Anderson and Carl Yeoman, will leave for the Future Farmers State Convention at Corvallis. The Coquille Chapter of vocational agriculture is among the best in the state and is one of the ten schools to be rated as a keystone chapter. At the convention each school is allowed to propose the names of two boys for the State Farmer Degree, which is the highest degree in the state in the Future Farmer organization. The names of Darrell Anderson and Harry Helmkin have been sent in as they have met all the requirements for such honors.
