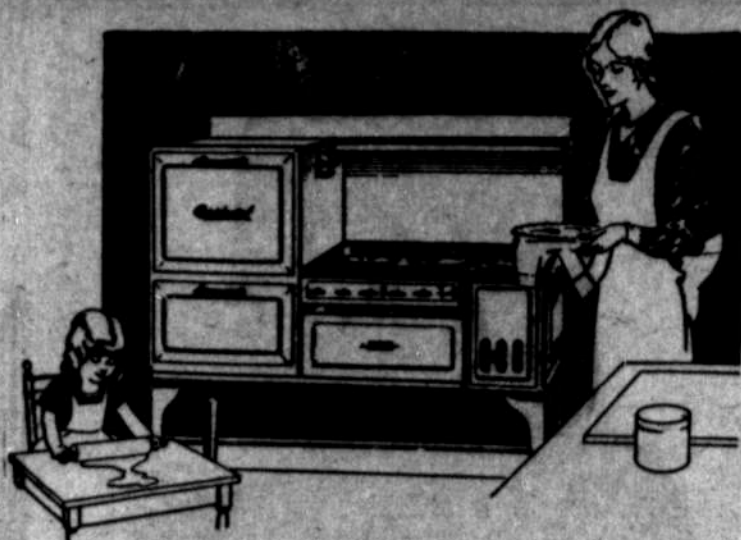

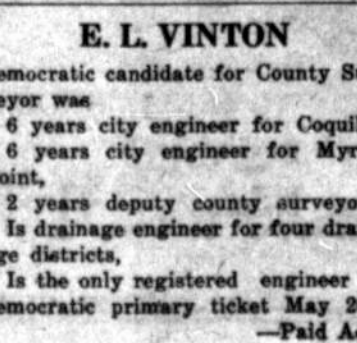

What Sen. Fred Steiwer Has Done for Coos County

That Fred Steiwer has done things for Coos county which entitle him to the support of the people of this section is the claim of his friends, and in looking over his record it appears that he has done more for Coos county than any senator the state has elected in the past two decades at least.

To begin with there was the Fourth of July celebration on Coos Bay in 1931, when Steiwer was asked to have the United States navy represented. His answer was the coming of the

destroyers Hovey and Long. A little thing, perhaps, but indicative of the sustained interest the senator has in all Oregon events.

Then we are informed that the Coos Bay Mutual creamery company and the National Co-operative Milk Producers had some correspondence with Steiwer on a tariff on dairy products. Steiwer helped get what they wanted, and it was his individual effort that secured a duty of 10c a pound on yellow oleomargarine.

He is the leader of the fight that is on right now for a decent tariff on lumber. He will take the fight to the floor of the senate. It will come up in the early days of June. His hands will be strengthened, it is claimed, by a huge majority at the primaries on May 20.

Steiwer has asked that Coos Bay coal be used to heat the new soldiers home at Roseburg.

Steiwer has a bill in to pay Bandon \$1,543.04 as the cost of the pavement in front of the Coast Guard station. It will pass.

Growers of bent grass seed in Coos county were competing for the market against foreigners and with only a duty of 10 cents a pound to help them. Steiwer responded to their calls for help and now the duty is 40 cents a pound and our local growers sell more seed at a better price.

Maybe it doesn't appear as a big thing elsewhere, but it increased the efficiency of the Coquille river coast guard station when the senator got a modern motor lifeboat assigned here this year.

The marine laboratory comes to the state as a result of the energy of Steiwer in trading lands in the Coos Head military reserve.

In the matter of the Coast highway, the friends of the senator claim for him a constant and efficient support of plans looking to its completion. He is now pressing for consideration of the emergency appropriation bill providing \$135,000,000 for highways, Oregon and the Coast road would get a lot of that.

In most part these are items that concern Coos county more than any other parts of the state, but Steiwer's friends claim he has been just as active on behalf of other counties.

That record includes constant support of bills for the helping of Oregon farmers—a record that Senator Arthur Capper, the great Kansas agricultural senator, said in the Topeka Capitol justified Oregon farmers in re-electing him. It includes a fight for development of the resources of the Columbia river, constant friendship for veterans of the wars—even votes to override presidential vetoes.

Steiwer's friends, who furnish these arguments for his re-election would like to see Coos county about unanimous on May 20.
