The combination of great pitching by Carl Gilbert and Penny Sturdivant combined with heavy slugging by most of the Loggers was too much for Gold Beach last Sunday. They went down to defeat 15 to 2. Previously the Curry team had been victorious over Eastside, 2 to 0, and had entered the fray last Sunday as a favorite.

Each club worked in a run in the first inning, Gold Beach on an error and a single, and Coquille by virtue of a well planned bunting attack which finally worked Pulford around. Gold Beach scored its last tally in the third frame, after which the locals took the situation well in hand. Murdock, curve ball ace, weakened during the fifth inning, allowing five runs to cross the platter, while Scritmeir, who followed him, could not overcome the disadvantage of loose fielding behind him.

In a way this game was a revenge affair with "Lefty" Brown and Harold Scritmeir, old Coquille performers, trying to make Bill Fortier and his cohorts do the moaning. As it was Brown did obtain a juicy bit of sweet revenge by clubbing out two singles in his three times up, leading the visitors in hitting. Loose fielding behind Scritmeir accounted for most of the runs scored off him.

Pulford, Guptill and Davis each swatted out three safe blows for the Loggers to do most of the run scoring for the day. Pulford's hits were all bunts, but they proved very helpful as Art was able to score four times.

Before the game was over Manager Fortier had put himself on first base, "Jug" Lorenz in center field, and "Penny" Sturdivant in the box. Coquille played stellar ball in the field, only one error being chalked up against their record.

Sport Briefs

Track competition for Coos County is to reach its peak tomorrow at Myrtle Point when five teams of the "A" division and six of the "B" league take the field in the annual county meet. Not only will this conclude the track season, but it will also spell final to athletics for the 1931-32 school year, a year which has seen one Coos County team play for the high school football championship of the state and the leading basketball quintet take fifth place in the Salem tournament.

To date Coquille has been listed as the favorite team to win the meet tomorrow, due to their defeat of the Marshfield team in a dual meet, and of Myrtle Point and Bandon in a tri-school affair. Coquille, however, has had the prior advantage of training, the other schools having been held up by poor condition of practice fields. This is especially evident in the work of the Marshfield team, for since their defeat by Coquille the Pirates have met and defeated North Bend, 76 to 46.

In the North Bend-Marshfield meet

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the Bender's hurdler, Maurice Ward, who is the holder of both hurdle records, did not come through with his customary wins. He, however, is expected to do so in the county competition. Not only this, but in the tri-school meet held at Coquille, Coach Easman withheld his three leading tracksters, Earl Woods, holder of the county dash records, McConnell, Miller, and Mike Ray, weight and jump man.

Last season ten county records were broken at Myrtle Point. This spring no such assault of the marks is looked for, although a few of the records may be threatened.

In winning the grade school track meet held last Saturday on Golden Field in Marshfield, the Coquille team took the event for the first time. To do so the local youngsters had to win the final event of the day, the 440-yard relay, taking five points in this race which gave them a total of 67½ points. This was a margin of one over North Bend and 1½ over Marshfield.

The relay team which won the meet for Coquille was composed of Louis Donaldson, Jim Miller, Bruce Ackerman, boys of the local eighth grade. Bruce Ackerman also broke the Class 4 broad jump record with a jump of 18 feet, ten inches. Seven other records were bested by contestants from other schools.

Crowds at the baseball games have been very small this season but this has not affected the caliber of the competition. So far, though some of the frays have been rather one-sided, each has been hotly contested, and upsets have occurred in many of the games. Marshfield, not expected to present much of a team, is at present leading the league by virtue of her two wins over Reedsport and North Bend. Coquille is in second place. North Bend, Sutherland and Gold Beach follow in the next three matches with an even 500 each, while Eastside and Reedsport are in the cellar without

a win on their records.
Ex-Coquille High School athletes who have attended colleges and universities this year have done very well in sports. Ray Woodyard won his numeral as a regular on the Willamette University Freshman team, and is now playing regularly at second base on the varsity baseball team. Edell Bryant, present holder of the Coos County mile and half mile records is the best Freshman miller at Oregon State, while Tallant Greenough holds the same honor as a 440-man at the University of Oregon. At Linfield College Everett Seeley made his football letter before dropping school, and Stanley Pulford at the same institution has played on the football team, though not as a letterman, on the Freshman basketball quintet, and now Pulford is on the track squad. In competition against Willamette on May 7th Stanley was winner in the 440-yard dash, covering the distance in :55.2. Last year he ran the same race in 53 seconds, to break the county record.
