J. P. Beyers, Candidate to Succeed Self, Co. Assessor

To the Voters of Coos County, Oregon:

I am announcing myself as republican candidate for the nomination to the office of Assessor at the Primary Election May 20, 1932, and being too busy with my official duties to make a personal campaign, I wish to submit to you the following statement:

If nominated and elected I will give the taxpayers of Coos County a just, fair and equitable assessment with the greatest degree of efficiency at the least possible cost, which is the platform on which I was elected in 1916, and which I have followed during my terms of office and will continue to follow if elected.

The knowledge acquired during the years I have been your Assessor has qualified me to carry out the statement made above. It is conceded that Coos County has one of the best assessment systems in Oregon, due to the fact that we have classified all of the different classes of property, thus obtaining accurate information to make a just and equitable assessment, even though it has required working nights to do it. The State Tax Commission of Oregon has adopted our system and is installing it in other counties of the State.

You should remember your Assessor does not vote your bonds or make your levies. These are made by the people themselves and he is no more responsible than any other individual. One-third of the taxes on the 1931 tax roll is for bonds, warrants, and interest. Forty-six per cent of the taxes is for schools, sixteen per cent is for roads. It is up to the taxpayer to reduce these levies if you cannot pay your taxes, your Assessor cannot do it.

If state-wide publicity means anything to Coos County, I wish to state that I am now serving as president of the Assessors' Association of Oregon, and have secured their annual meeting for Coos County in August of this

year. A number of assessors are bringing their families and after the meeting are going to spend their vacation at our beaches.

I have lived in Coos County since 1884, and am deeply interested in the welfare of its people and if elected will serve you to the best of my ability. If you approve of the work I have done for the taxpayers of Coos County and desire a continuance of a just and equitable assessment for all, I most earnestly solicit your support.

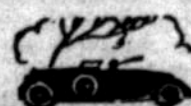

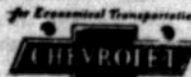
