My dear Mr. Ross:

I have your letter of May 9th. In reply permit me to say that originally it was my intention to participate in any way in the present campaign. However, in view of the fact that you state in your letter that the voters are being deceived and misled by published statements that the voters' power is being taken away from them, I feel that it is my duty to reserve my vote for the platform on which the late George W. Johnson was nominated for governor and which I was so proud to support.

These representations, of course, are entirely false. Without compensation Col. Clark desired both the public utility and water power legislation recommended by me in my inaugural message. The water power legislation recommended by me at his own expense. The most important legislation, in my opinion, ever enacted by a woman legislator.

Without compensation and at his own expense Col. Clark, at my request, accompanied me to Washington, D. C. last February to plead before the Board of Army Engineers and President Hoover for the development of the State's principal plank in the Joseph platform on which I was elected.

In addition to having been in full accord with my water power and utility legislation, Col. Clark has also rendered valuable aid to me in connection with my Economy and tax reduction program.

I want to add in conclusion that the principles for which Col.
