In Circuit Court This Week

The jury in the case of Miller vs. Gant brought in a verdict last Friday in the two cases for \$373.96 and \$25 attorney fee in favor of the plaintiff.

In the case of Tillie Woodson vs. Ann Hallman, in which she was suing for damages as the result of an accident above Myrtle Point when the defendant's car was wrecked as she turned out to avoid hitting a band of sheep, the jury returned a verdict of \$2378 for the plaintiff.

In the case of Maybelle Loveland Maiden, who was suing the State Industrial Accident Commission for compensation, on appeal from the commission's rulings, Judge Brand heard the case without jury and awarded her \$15 a month for partial temporary disability. She was injured at the Smith Wood-Products plant last October, and after paying for operation, hospital and medical expense, the commission refused further compensation.

The case of the Coos Bay Lumber Co. vs. Pat Geaney was started in court yesterday. The plaintiff is suing for \$1983.43 for destruction of a part of its logging railroad trestle out on Cunningham, near the county farm. Their complaint is that the defendant did not exercise due caution in protecting their property from a fire it is claimed he started.

Harold, 10-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Shull, underwent an operation for appendicitis last Monday.

On Tuesday, Alta Brant, of Coquille, submitted to a similar operation.

Mrs. Slipp, of Myrtle Point, was dismissed Wednesday after receiving treatment for a few days.

County C. of C. Session

The County Chamber of Commerce met in the Chandler Hotel in Marshfield, Monday evening, with representatives from Coquille, Myrtle Point, North Bend and Marshfield present.

The request that Coos county take a page in the Pictorial, to be issued by the Portland American Legion next month, and sent to delegates to the national convention before they leave home, was turned down by the committee because of lack of funds and referred to the several chambers in the county for individual action. A page will cost \$300, and it is proposed to issue 48,000.

Ed W. Miller reported on Coast Highway Association activity, and stated that a federal engineer would be in the county in September to look over the route for the proposed Powers-Grants Pass road, on which he will report to the joint meeting of the state highway commission and Federal Bureau of Roads representatives in October.

Geo. C. Huggins introduced a resolution to rescind the action of the county chamber a month ago when a resolution was adopted, protesting the action of the State Industrial Accident Commission in contracting with Wesley Hospital to handle all its cases in southwestern Oregon. Mr. Huggins' resolution was laid over until the August meeting after a vote on its adoption stood four to four.

Coquille was represented at the meeting by J. E. Norton and H. A. Young.

Bound Over to Grand Jury

As the result of an alleged fight between Glenn Shores and Mike Minard, Shores found himself in Justice court and Minard was taken to Maest hospital. Shores was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon and was bound over to the grand jury on \$1000 bail which was furnished and he was released. Minard was treated for a split left ear, closed left eye and a four-inch scalp wound.—Myrtle Point Herald.

Complaints Received at Salem

Some complaints have been heard here from county courts following the announcement by the state highway commission that it would pay 50 cents an hour for hand labor on emergency relief work this year. The county officials declare that the pay scale is too high and makes for dissatisfaction on the part of their employees who receive less pay for the same work.
