Cecil Laws Won Sperry Prize

Cecil Laws won the prize—a sack of "Surelay" chicken feed, offered by the Sperry Flour Co. last Saturday to the one guessing the nearest to the time of flight of the carrier pigeons from "Sperryville," at Farr & Elwood's here, to the home loft in Portland.

His guess was 8 hours and 49 seconds. The time consumed by the birds was a little short of that. No. 31, released at 11:40 a. m., Saturday, made the trip in 7 hours and 22 minutes. Five others were released at 3:15 p. m. No. 591 reached Portland in 7 hours and 32 minutes, and No. 113 in 7 hours and 35 minutes.

The message from Mayor J. Arthur Berg, of Coquille, to Mayor Geo. L. Baker, of Portland, which the pigeons carried in their leg band, read: "Greetings to you and your people from the people of Coquille, Oregon, the home of Chittim and Cheese; Power to start and Power to stop."

There are other birds to a lesser degree which have the homing instinct of the carrier pigeon, but it is a remarkable trait. The birds do not fly straight through. Sam Whetstone tells of one which stopped at his place, at the rear of the laundry, for two or three days recently. It was nearly exhausted when it alighted, and he could pick it up, but not after the first day.

These pigeons were released here last Saturday as a feature of the Sperry show at the Farr & Elwood store and warehouse.

All Labor Liens Share Alike

After a day's hearing on the affairs of the Coquille Lumber Co. in circuit court Tuesday, Judge Brand ruled that the liens of loggers against the company were as preferred a claim as were those of the mill operatives, and that the liens of Messrs. L. A. Christensen, Jack Hultin, Brown and Heath, amounting to \$1000 should be paid from funds now in the receiver's hands. This, with the \$1,983.53 assigned labor liens to Chas. Yarbrough, brings the total labor liens close to \$3,000.

The court also allowed \$500 for legal expenses—\$5 to the attorney and \$1.20 filing fee for each lien.

Receiver M. O. Hawkins reported to the court that he had \$2900 on hand, beside the \$2700 in the Farmers & Merchants Bank, now in process of liquidation. The funds there cannot be available until after Sept. 9.

Judge J. T. Brand was ill and unable to be over here for court on Wednesday and Thursday, but sent word yesterday that he would hear the case of John Dornath vs. H. E. Watkins and wife, today.

Swimming Pool Being Used

The swimming pool committee of the Lions Club reported at yesterday noon's luncheon that the pool had been full of water and kids ever since last Saturday. E. V. Hand has been secured to act as caretaker there and to save little tots who may get in over their heads.

There is still much to be done to put the pool and surrounding grounds, as well as the bath houses, into the condition desired, but it cannot all be done this year. It is hoped by next year that funds will be available for procuring fifty or more yards of gravel, so that the water will not be kept as muddy as it is now with the soft dirt bottom.

ers may leave them at the Sentinel or Mt. States offices or they will be called for upon notice to members of the committee.

The solicitation committee met with very fair success this week, but a large portion of the contributions were of produce rather than cash, and there is a need for funds just now to pay for the tin cans of which the committee decided to order 2,000, last evening. These cans are not for home use, but will be filled and steam-pressure cooked by assistants, either in the kitchen at the Legion headquarters or in the Pioneer church kitchen.

Contributions of fruit, vegetables and meat are earnestly requested, both from people outside and inside of Coquille. A little later it is expected to have trucks make loop trips over all the highways and roads running from Coquille to gather up what the ranchers may be willing to donate. The committee also hopes to effect an exchange plan, by which labor can be furnished to farmers who will pay for such labor with supplies from the ranch to the relief committee, and the laborer will be compensated with food and articles to the value of \$1.50 for each day's work.

To the itinerant, a can of mulligan is to be given, but only after two hours of labor.

One of the projects on which labor can be employed in exchange for supplies—not cash—will be work around the swimming pool, where there is a great deal of clearing yet to be done, and considerable wood cutting. And that is to be the policy of the relief committee, exchange and barter of necessary supplies for labor performed. It is thought that with the whole-souled co-operation of those who are regularly employed, that no one need suffer for the actual necessities of life in the Coquille section this coming winter.

20 Acres Canary Grass Cut

J. L. Smith did not harvest as much Reed canary grass for seed this year as he has in years past, only 20 acres being cut. His crew finished threshing this week, but he has not yet cleaned it. He followed a different system this year, and had had huge canvas covers made on which he dumped the seed in the field as soon as it was cut and threshed it from the canvas.

He is now busy cutting 90 acres of hay on the former Chandler place on Lathmus Slough, which is owned by Lyman Carrier.

Roadmaster Leaman Resigns

W. D. Leaman, who has served Coos county as roadmaster since W. A. Gilbert resigned a year or more ago, has tendered his resignation to the county court, effective in 60 days, or at the pleasure of the court. The law requires a roadmaster to be a registered engineer, and Mr. Leaman does qualify in that regard.

The court has not named a successor, nor has it any immediate intention of doing so.

Roseburg Team Coming for Logger Game Sunday

Roseburg, fastest club of Douglas county and perhaps the speediest of Southern Oregon baseball, will furnish the opposition for the Coquille Loggers here Sunday. The local batters are going to see if the Roseburg nine really has any claim on the above-stated honors, and if Fortier's boys can defeat the Douglas team they will claim the titles originally boasted of by their opposition.

It is known that Roseburg has defeated the strong Sutherlin aggregation twice in recent contests, submerging the league team by decisive scores. Sutherlin is battling the Loggers for first place in the Southern Oregon Coast League so by this, one can imagine the calibre of the ball played by the Roseburg outfit.

According to the Southern Oregon Coast League schedule and standing, Coquille is now one-half a game ahead of Sutherlin in the averages, having played one more game than the Douglas team. Sutherlin has a game to play with North Bend as yet and if she is winner in this she will tie Coquille in the standing.

This will mean that if the championship is to be decided, Sutherlin and Coquille will have to meet in a game to bring the issue to a close. About this Manager Fortier of the Coquille Loggers says, "We are willing and ready to meet Sutherlin in a game if the Douglas team is able to overcome the North Bend boys. We don't care if the game is played in Coquille, Sutherlin, or Podunk. It doesn't matter where, because I'm sure that my boys can beat Sutherlin any time."

not seem to realize their distress and are as happy as though they had a dollar in their pockets.

In the blue grass section of Kentucky, between Lexington and Louisville, they saw farm after farm where the famous thoroughbred racers are reared and describe it as a most beautiful country.

In Kansas, where Mr. Eubanks was encamped at Camp Funston during the war, nothing remains except a memorial monument to the boys who received training there.

They drove to the summit of Pike's Peak, just out of Colorado Springs, and Mrs. Eubanks experienced the same nausea that the writer did when he walked up to the summit of that 14,000 feet elevation 30 years ago.

At Taos, New Mexico, where four Indian tribes have headquarters and reservations, the claim is made that the oldest church in the United States still stands; but the same claim is made in New Orleans, in Florida, and in southern California. Take your choice.

They visited the Painted Desert in Arizona and the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, and stopped at the Petrified Forest from which they brought several specimens and left one in the Sentinel office. This highly colored piece of petrified wood is estimated by scientists to be one hundred to one hundred and fifty million years old. The trees were at one time in the dim past on the tropical portion of the globe, they slipped to lower levels, were later, for million of years, under the waters of the Pacific ocean where the pressure and chemical action of the salt water turned the wood to stone.

After a few days' visit with Mr. Eubanks' parents in Los Angeles, and Austin Hazard in Pasadena, they came north.

They expect to return east by the northern route through Yellowstone Park and the Lincoln Highway to Buffalo.
