World Wheat Less, Pigs Fewer

World wheat supplies available dur-
ing the summer and fall months are
expected to be considerably smaller
than a year ago, says a market report
of the O. S. C. extension service. The
carryover is smaller and the new crop
less than last year in the Northern
Hemisphere.

Production is expected to be small-
er in Europe as well as in North
America, according to the report.
Production in the whole Northern
Hemisphere is now expected to be around
200,000,000 bushels less than a
year ago and carryover about 15-
200,000 bushels smaller.

"Practically all of the reduction in
the prospective supplies of wheat in
the Northern Hemisphere is accounted
for in the United States," the cir-
cular states. "The winter wheat crop
in this country is so short that the total
wheat supply is expected to be around
700,000,000 bushels less than during
the year ended June 30, despite in-
creased carryover and a much larger
spring wheat crop than last year."

The Government pig crop report as
of June 1 which was released on July
12 indicated that seven per cent fewer
pigs were saved this year in the United
States than in 1931, says the col-
lege report. Farmers also reported
intentions to farrow approximately
the same number of sows from June 1
to December 1.

G. E. Hamilton, who sold The Her-
