Conference Begins August 18

From the Pacific Methodist Advocate we clip the following about the Young People's Assembly and the Northwest Conference of the M. E. Church South, which opens its first session in Coquille, two weeks from yesterday. Rev. W. H. Nelson, editor of the Advocate, will be here for the sessions:

The Tenth Session of the Northwest Conference Assembly, which includes the Young People's Assembly and the Standard Training School, under the direction of the Northwest Conference and the General Board of Christian Education, will meet in Coquille, Oregon, August 18th to 24th, and the Annual Conference follows. The Rev. P. D. Hartman and his fine helpers at Coquille will prove ideal hosts.

This ought to be a great year for the Assembly, and there should be a record-breaking attendance, for, despite the financial depression, there is no decline in interest among our preachers and people on the Coast as far as our summer assemblies go.

Another reason for going to the Assembly this year is in the fact that it is held at Coquille. Here is a beautiful little town in Coos County, Oregon, down near the Pacific Ocean, a thriving town of nearly 3,000 inhabitants. We have a church there which does us proud. It is the best church building in town, and it would grace a town of much larger population. When you get out into Coos county you are in the tall timbers, sure enough. Here is a wealth of cedar, spruce and myrtle. It is said that there is enough timber in Oregon to build five-room bungalows which would girdle the globe if set a hundred feet apart, besides building sidewalks sixteen feet wide, putting up the necessary telegraph poles, and then leaving enough lumber left over to build every family a garage.

In the palm days of the lumber industry the mills there were cutting from a half-million to a million feet of lumber in a day.

And not only was it a land of tall, stately trees, with trackless forests, but it was a land of milk and honey. They used to produce enough milk in that county to supply a large part of the surrounding country, besides supplying plenty of butter for the royal slice of bread; and there was enough cheese produced in the Western Oregon country to give this section a reputation all over the United States.

It is a great place for those who love to fish. Of course, commercial fishing is done on a large scale in Coos county, and as far as fishing just for the fun of it, and the average man loves to do that very thing, it is a country that delights the heart.

But one of the biggest incentives for going to Coquille this year is found in the pleasant memories of those who attended the Assembly of 1929. They remember the fine folk there, the gracious hospitality of the people, the magnificent climate, the fine facilities for holding an Assembly furnished by the church and the school authorities there; and it is because of this memory many of our people in the Northwest who were fortunate enough to be at Coquille then will want to go this year.
