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W. M. Cunning Writes of Another Future Farmer

Russell Martindale, upon entering the Smith-Hughes Agricultural work in the Coquille High School, decided to become a breeder of purebred sheep. Coos county with its many thousands of acres of cut-over land offers a good opportunity for sheep raising.

Russell chose the Dorset Horn breed of sheep for his project as they are good grazers and very prolific. They are especially noted for the early maturity of their lambs.

He purchased his foundation stock, consisting of three ewes and one ram, from a well known breeder in the Willamette Valley, paying \$137.00 for them.

He exhibited these animals at the Coos and Curry County Fair in 1930, winning eight first prizes and two second prizes. His project was also judged the outstanding sheep project in Smith-Hughes work in the county for that year.

On balancing his books for the first year, he showed a net profit of \$115.80.

At the beginning of Russell's second year he found he had fourteen head. Thirteen of these he showed again at the County Fair, winning ten first prizes and three second prizes.

His project was again judged the outstanding sheep project of the county which entitled him to the prize, a purebred sheep, which is given each year by the Coquille chapter of the Lions club.

At the close of his second year Russell found that he had made \$577.65, which includes credit for his labor at twenty-five cents per hour and the value of the animals on hand.

The Dorset Horn sheep is meeting with favor in the county and Russell has been able to sell a good many for breeding stock.

Russell has always lived on a farm and has become quite an expert in sheep raising. By the time he graduates from high school he will have a good start in the sheep business and will understand how to care for them.

Carmel Sanders Again in Jail

Carmel Sanders was sentenced to serve 41 days in jail by Recorder Leslie last Saturday. He had paid a \$20 fine the Saturday before on a drunk charge, and when he appeared again last Saturday the judge picked up a 31-day sentence still hanging over him, added 10 days and sent him up to the county bastille.

Three Stills, Two Operators

Clyde Hedges, federal prohibition officer for this district, reports "knocking over" three stills the past week. Last Friday he and Deputy Everett Strain found mash, still, liquor and paraphernalia on the David DuBois place, two and a half miles south of Langlois, and arrested DuBois. He was fined \$100 on his plea of guilty.

Last Saturday Mr. Hedges, with Deputies Hunt and McCullom seized a large still on the Coos City-Summer road, a mile about the Country Club. It was one of the largest pots found by the officers in a long time, a 90-gallon affair, and there were also 700 gallons of mash and other equipment in the hiding place. Although the officers had been watching it no one had appeared and no arrest has been made.

On Wednesday evening Sheriff Hess, Mr. Hedges and Deputy C. W. Hunt, found Manuel D. Sutphine, father of twelve children in the act of making brandy from berries on his place three miles up Big Creek from the highway. A 20-gallon still, 350 gallons of brandy mash and two or three gallons of brandy were seized. The family came here from West Virginia two years ago.

He pleaded guilty before Justice Stanley yesterday to possession of a still and was sentenced to six months in jail. He is to be paroled after ten days.
