present administration agree with such a policy and it is to be continued with the exception of grades one, two, and three. Mid-year classes are to be cared for in these grades. This gives the primary teachers an opportunity to properly place every child. It also gives opportunity for an extra good foundation of the work to follow. By the process of tests this mid-year group will automatically eliminate itself at the end of the third year. This means then that a mid-year class will be entering the first grade January 16, 1933.

Concerning the ages for entering the first grade: Children who are six or will be six by December first may enter in September. Children who will be six by March first may enter on January sixteen.

As far as possible we urge that students come provided with pencils and papers on Tuesday, September sixth. Teachers are planning to hold most of the students all day on that date.

Questions will be gladly answered by the superintendent's office.

Next Week at the Liberty

Far up in the foothills of the beautiful Santa Cruz mountains a fretful little passenger engine puffs around a curve in the distance and pulls up to a dinky station. Behind the engine is a baggage car and two old-time wooden coaches. As this train, reminiscent of branch-line railroad of two decades ago, comes to a stop, there arrives a sleepy old horse drawing a spring-wagon loaded with a mother, her three daughters, two sons, a baby, a dog and much baggage.

Imbued with the excitement of the moment, the mother hurriedly unlloads her brood, aided and abetted by the oldest daughter, an impulsive miss of sixteen or seventeen dressed in a strange old-fashioned costume of high shoes, skirt and jacket, topped by a ridiculous hat of velvet, flying flowers and feathers. The dog rushes about, barking and yapping. The two boys struggle with the strange hair trunk and the hand luggage. The girl is trying to say goodbye to everyone at once, trying to listen to last-minute instructions, trying to suppress tears.

In two minutes the girl is deposited safely on the rear platform of the last coach. The whistle interrupts still another round of goodbye kisses, which now have to be replaced by hand waving as the train starts. The girl gives way to tears as the little group on the station platform begins to grow smaller but is forced to check them again in order to wave back the dog who is futilely chasing the train.

The scene is the departure of Rebecca from Sunnybrook Farm, as filmed in the modernized Fox version. It is the start of Rebecca's amazing conquest of hypocrisy and her glorious search for romance. Marian Nixon, as Rebecca, is temperamentally, physically and spiritually fitted for the role. As she enacted this scene for Alfred Santell, the director, each of the staff who accompanied the troupe on location knew she had begun a performance that was to eclipse any ever given of the world-famed "Rebecca," which appears for three days at the Liberty Theatre here, starting Sunday.

It Would Increase Taxes

Al G. Brown, of Eugene, secretary of the University of Oregon Alumni Association, spent three days in Coos county this week and was a Coquille visitor on Monday. He further added that in tracing the connections of outstanding proponents of the bill it was found that quite often the supporter was interested, either himself or through relationship, in the advance of real estate values which would result at Corvallis.

To Combat Pea Weevil

A. O. Larson, who is federal entomologist stationed at the State College, was in Coos county, Sunday conferring with County Agent Jenkins regarding a program which will prevent infestation of pea weevil in this section. Mr. Larson has been working on this problem for the past two years and has promised his support to growers in this section from infestation of this pest. The burning or feeding of the pea vines immediately after the crop has been harvested was outlined by Mr. Larson as being the necessary steps which should be taken on farms or in gardens it is stated.
