County Agent Jenkins Tells of 4-H Club Winners

The following article, written by County Agent Jenkins, was sent to all newspapers in the county and was not prepared for one as erroneously stated in a daily paper.

Outstanding accomplishments on the part of 4-H club members of Coos county during the year resulted in the awarding of a registered Holstein heifer calf to Sidney Cadman, a registered Jersey calf to Howard Leatherman, the second place in the state 4-H health club contest to Donald Schmidt and a trip to the state fair for fifteen members and leaders.

The registered Holstein calf was presented to Sidney Cadman, of Coquille, by the Mount Angel College stock farm as an award for being selected the highest scoring Holstein calf club member at the state fair which just closed in Salem.

This brings to Coos county one of the outstanding awards of the year for achievement in 4-H club work, according to state officials. Sidney and his brother, Teddy, are both members of the Coquille Calf club which is led by H. S. Cadman, father of the boys. Other members of the club are Orville Clinton, Wilbur Collins and Edith Collins, all of Coquille. In addition to their calf club work, both of the Cadman boys were members of the Valley View Pig club led by Fred Schmidt, of Norway. In this project they raised and kept records on a registered litter of Duroc-Jersey hogs, the parent stock coming from one of the outstanding breeders in the west.

The registered Jersey calf awarded each year by George E. Hampton, of Arago, to the highest scoring Jersey calf member in the county went to Howard Leatherman, of Lee, who is a member of the Lee Valley Calf club led by Charles Leatherman. The basis of award of this calf is interest in the work, attendance at meetings and tours, judging ability, the animal and the record book. No one member is eligible to receive more than one calf. Howard tied for high point man in the county judging contest. He was a member of two divisions, showed two animals at the fair, attended all club meetings held and all judging tours and completed both record books.

Two 4-H judging contests were held during the year. All club members attending were allowed to compete and the average score of both contests was used as a basis for selecting judging teams to represent the county. A team from the Arago Calf club consisting of Price Schroeder, Woodrow Robison and Luray Miller, placed highest in the contests with a score of 77 and represented Coos county in the judging contest at the state fair. The Coos River team and the Lee Valley team tied in the county contest for second place with 75 points each. Second place was given to the Lee Valley team because the story of work done was not turned in with the record books by the Coos River team. The Lee team consisting of Howard Leatherman, Ralph Wilson and Earl Moore will have an opportunity to compete in a judging contest at the Pacific International. James Smith, a member of the Coos River team, tied with Howard Leatherman for high point man in the county judging contests. In addition to James, Clifford Brunell and Ralph Oxenrider were members of the Coos River team.

Club members who attended the state fair from Coos county were complimented very highly by George Jenkins, county agent, on the interest shown and on the winnings made. The winning of the registered calf by Sidney Cadman was partly due to the co-operation of other members as herdsmanship was one of the points considered, according to Mr. Jenkins.

Livestock taken to the fair by 4-H club members made a creditable showing, according to reports from the state fair grounds. Herbert Carl, of Arago, placed fifth on a registered Jersey yearling heifer shown by Melden Carl who attended the state fair as high point club boy. Sidney Cadman placed first in the club class on his registered junior Holstein calf and fifth in open class. Teddy Cadman placed fourth in club classes and sixth in open class on a registered junior Holstein calf. In hogs, Sidney Cadman placed second with his pen of four Duroc Jerseys and Teddy placed sixth on his Duroc Jersey junior gilt.
