Pat Dillon went to the Johnson Mt. district to spend the winter. He went by pack train Wednesday.

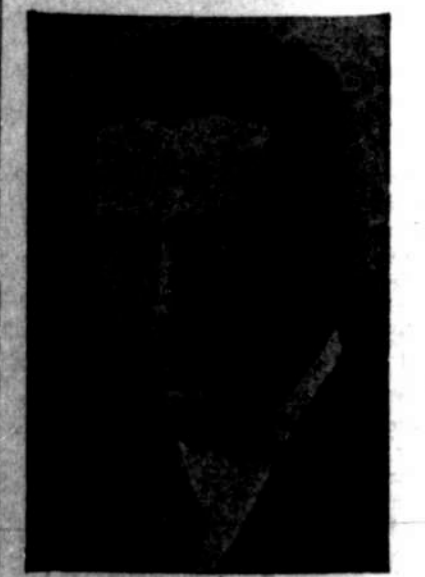
Knife Hospital Notes
