**Secretary of State Hoss' Plan Endorsed by Gov. Meier**

In a letter this week to Secretary of State Hal Hoss, Julius L. Meier, governor of Oregon, recognizes the merit of the position consistently taken by the Secretary regarding the automobile license fee by agreeing on the point raised by Hoss last summer concerning the need for legislative action to cure the present evils of a too high license. Hoss, it will be remembered, has been a steadfast



champion for a lower license fee, but realized that it required action by the state legislature to bring about the desired result.

A year ago last April, soon after the Washington legislature enacted a \$3 license fee Secretary Hoss took an active part in the program to bring about a revision of Oregon license fees, and since that time has been working on plans which he will have ready for the action of the next session of the legislature.

In his letter asking Hoss for his views on the automobile license problem, Governor Meier said he wished to have them for consideration in connection with his message to the legislature, and went on to invite the Secretary to present other matters concerning any of the latter's departments which he believed would be furthered by a recommendation in the Governor's message.

In effect substantiating and endorsing the stand taken by Secretary Hoss last summer regarding the proper procedure to correct the conditions that face Oregon motorists today, the Governor's letter says in part:

"Believing that you share my interests in arriving at a solution of this problem which will be in the best interests of the state as a whole, I desire to avail myself of the experiences and facilities of your office. It appears that if any relief is to be afforded, legislative changes are necessary. I should, therefore, appreciate having you submit your view of this matter for consideration in the preparation for my message, together with your recommendations as to legislation which you consider desirable in this connection."

Hoss has indicated that he will discuss his plans with the Governor and be prepared to present a number of statistical compilations covering license fees, and gasoline taxes to the automobile committees of the legislature when it convenes in January.
