One Conviction in Circuit Court

In circuit court this week, Chas. Davis, negro, was found not guilty of the crime for which he was indicted—living with and off the earnings of a prostitute, a colored woman. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty of living off her earnings, but this did not coincide with the judge's instructions in regard to illegal habitation and they were sent back for further consideration of the case. The not guilty verdict resulted.

Dave Davis was found guilty of operating a still and was sentenced to a maximum of one year in the pen. Chas. Feller was found not guilty

of violating the Coos county crab law, the decision being that the sale prohibition did not extend to crabs caught in the ocean. It was in the nature of a test case.

Chas. Zumwalt was found not guilty of the reckless driving charge for which he had been indicted.

The case against Jack Perry, accused of burglary not in a dwelling, at Myrtle Point, was dismissed on motion of the district attorney, because of lack of evidence.

An Expensive Record

THAT at the last Grand Jury session the District Attorney investigated 21 cases and of these, here were 11 investigations in which 58 witnesses were called and 11 not true bills returned at an expense to Coos County of approximately \$350 thereby showing that very little, if any, investigation was made by the District Attorney prior to incurring this expense.
